3	detainee: Omar Mohammed Ali Al-Rammah (ISN 1017) As a
4	reminder the unclassical portion of these processing are
5	being reordered for the purpose of generating a transcript
6	to be posted on the PRS website.
7	HQ Translator: Translates above.
8	CA: Representatives from the following agencies are present and
9	are members of the Board: Department of Defense, Department
10	of State. Department of Justice, Department of Homeland
11	Security, Office of the Director of National Intelligence
12	and Office of the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.
13	The following personnel are also present: Legal Advisor to
14	the Board, Case Administrators, Personal Representative,
15	Private Counsel, translators, the detainee and the Security
16	Officer.
17	HQ Translator: Translates above.
18	CA: The detainee's Personal Representative, the detainee, and
19	translator are located at the detention facility, U.S.
20	Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. They are attending via
21	video teleconference. The detainee has waived translation
22	of the unclassified summary, the Personal Representative's
23	statement. The unclassified summary has been posted to the
24	Periodic Review Secretariat website. Foreign, national and
25	local media; Foreign Government Officials and
26	Representatives from Non-Governmental Organizations may be
27	observing this session.
28	HQ Translator: Translates above.
29	PM: This Board is convened to determine whether continued law
30	of war detention is warranted for Omar Mohammed Ali Al-
31	Rammah (ISN 1017) to protect against a continuing
32	significant threat to the security of the United States

33	From here on forward we will refer to the detainee as
34	Zakariya. This session of this hearing is unclassified.
35	HQ Translator: Translates above.
36	PR: Zakariya this is your Period Review Board to determine
37	whether continue Law of War detention is warranted in your
38	case. Continued Law of War detention will be warranted if
39	it is necessary to protect against a continuing significant
40	threat to the security of the United States. The focus of
41	this hearing is on the threat you may pose to the United
42	States and its interest if transfer of released from U.S.
43	custody. It is not on the lawfulness of detention.
44	HQ Translator: Translates above.
45	CA: The Personal Representative and Private Counsel are your
46	representative to assist you during this process. Finally
47	the translators ensure that everyone understands your
48	statements and that you understand what is being said
49	during the hearing.
50	HQ Translator: Translates above.
51	CA: Personal Representative and Private Counsel as the detainee
52	had an opportunity to review the Unclassified Summary?
53	HQ Translator: Translates above.
54	PR: Yes, Sir.
55	PM: Thank you. I will now read the UNCLASSIFIED SUMMARY:
56	Omar Muhammad Ali al-Rammah (ISN 1017) probably was a low-
57	level mujahidin fighter in Bosnia during the mid-1990s
58	before becoming a facilitator for an al-Qa'ida affiliated
59	extremists in the late 1990s. He may have trained at al-
60	Qa'ida-associated camps in Afghanistan before relocating to
61	Georgia in mid-2001 to support the Chechen jihad. Rammah
62	was arrested in April 2002 in an operation in which he was
63	to provide detonators for a remote-controlled explosive

64 device. Does the Personal Representative wish to make unclassified Opening Statement at this time? 65 HQ Translator: Translates above. 66 Yes, Sir. 67 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 68 69 I would like to remind all participants that any 70 information shared at this time must be unclassified. 71 there is a concern about the classification of the 72 information, I will indicate as such and will stop the proceedings until it is resolved. Has the detainee had the 73 opportunity to review your statements? 74 75 HQ Translator: Translates above. Yes, Sir. 76 PR: 77 PC: Yes, Sir. Personal Representative, please proceed. 78 79 GTMO Translator: Translates above. Members of the Board, I thank you for the opportunity to 80 81 review Zakariya's case. Of all the detainees I have worked with, Zakariya has impressed me the most with his ongoing, 82 83 full-hearted participation in the PRB process. Despite receiving negative results in the past, he has continued to 84 85 meet with me at every opportunity and has been proactive in working on documents for the board. While I never met 86 Zakariya during the early years of his detainment in 87 Guantanamo Bay, the Zakariya I have come to know has a true 88 89 appreciation for American culture and society. He loves to talk about American movies and television shows and discuss 90 with me how realistically they actually depict life in the 91 United States. When I met with Zakariya earlier this year, 92 93 I asked him about his plans for the future. He told me his dream would be to one day work in the film industry, making 94 95 movies like those that have kept his spirits up during his

96	detention. Zakariya acknowledged that this dream is
97	unlikely to come to fruition, but told me instead he would
98	love to simply own his own café or food truck one day: a
99	small business that could provide financial security for
100	himself and, God-willing, a family. On my next visit,
101	Zakariya had taken the initiative to put together the
102	business plan we submitted to you. I want to highlight that
103	this is a three-part plan, which starts with him getting a
104	job in a coffee shop, learning about the business while he
105	works and saves for the future. While this may seem
106	insignificant, I think it highlights the difference between
107	the Zakariya of today and the Zakariya who was recruited as
108	a teenager. Speaking about his future, Zakariya is excited
109	for all the things he took for granted when he left his
110	home in the 90s: he longs to be reunited with his mother
111	and siblings, he is eager to work at a simple, reliable
112	job, and he is ready to start a family of his own. In other
113	words, over the past 20 years, Zakariya has changed and
114	grown. I appreciate your time in this matter and your
115	consideration for a transfer recommendation for Zakariya.
116	PM: Board Members may reserve questions until detainee and
117	witness statements have been presented in their entirety.
118	However, does anyone have any questions at this time?
