30	continued law of war detention is warranted for Mohammed

34	as Abu Waaafa. This session of this hearing is			
35	unclassified.

57	Mohammed Abdul Malik Bajabu (ISN 10025) was inspired by a			
58	radical imam to leave Kenya in 1996 to receive extremist			
59	training in Somalia, where he developed a close			
60	relationship with members of the now-defunct al-Qa'ida in			
61	East Africa (AQEA), including senior operational planners			
62	such as Harun Fazul. Bajabu became an AQEA facilitator and			
63	was closely involved in the preparation and execution of			
64	the attacks in Mombasa. Kenya. in November 2002. against			

65 the Paradise Hotel and an Israeli airliner. In February 2007, Kenyan authorities arrested Bajabu for his 66 67 involvement in the Mombasa attacks and transferred him to US custody a few weeks later. Does the Personal 68 69 Representative wish to make unclassified Opening Statement 70 at this time? 71 HO Translator: Translates above. PR: Yes, Sir. 72 PC: Yes, Sir. 73 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 74 75 PM: I would like to remind all participants that any information shared at this time must be unclassified. 76 Tf there is a concern about the classification of the 77 information, I will indicate as such and will stop the 78 79 proceedings until it is resolved. his Personal Representative has stated, and as prior
counsel have represented to this Board, there are strong
reasons favoring Abdul Malik's clearance by this Board.
First, and perhaps most importantly, is the large amount of
family support that Abdul Malik will receive from his
family. This Board is already aware from previous
submissions that Abdul Malik has a large and loving family
who remain ready and willing to assist with his return and
repatriation. Abdul Malik's sisters both live in Kenya,
and while his wife and three children live in Somalia, they
are willing to move to Kenya in order to be reunited with
him. Like most families over the last year, Abdul Malik's
family has been affected by the coronavirus pandemic.
Reprieve has worked to support his family during that time,
and will continue to do so after Abdul Malik is released
and returned to them. I should also highlight the length
of time Abdul Malik has spent in detention: over 14 years
without charge or trial. This lengthy detention stands in
contrast to the fact that each of Abdul Malik's co-accused
with whom he was arrested have long lived as free men. I am
unaware of any threat posed to the United States or any
other nation because of their freedom. Likewise, Abdul
Malik poses no threat. To the contrary, I think this world
would be a much better place if Abdul Malik were a free
man. Indeed, Abdul Malik is among the most compliant
detainees, a result of his devotion to peace and healing.
Prior counsel has noted that he can quote Mohandas Ghandi
and Dr. Martin Luther King like teenagers quote Taylor
Swift. And I would add one additional piece of source
material - the Bible. While Abdul Malik does not have
access to one, he has been able to learn some quotes from
television programs, and is always sure to bring a new

quote with him to our meetings, sometimes asking me to make
sure he has them recorded correctly. Most of the quotes
are from Psalms, but he was particularly affected by a
quote from Matthew's Gospel (16:26): "What does it profit a
man to gain the world, but lose his soul?" Abdul Malik,
maybe more than any person I know, lives that principal
each day. He practices meditation and yoga, and identifies
himself as a "healer" - something he was doing long before
his detention. He is constantly reassuring others in
precarious situations that everything will be alright. I
have spoken to family members of his who have lost jobs,
received troubling medical news, and experienced the loss
of loved ones who have been buoyed by their family calls
with Abdul Malik. And, at the beginning of the coronavirus
lockdown, Abdul Malik was sure to remind me to keep myself
safe, and to assure me that he was praying not only for me,
but for all Americans, during the height of the outbreak.
Abdul Malik is patient, tolerant and empathetic. He is an
avid reader, and prefers books that contain a moral message
about how to live an upright life. While he has never
downplayed the effects of his long incarceration, he has
always approached his situation positively, dispelling any
negativity with humor and grace. In evaluating whether
Abdul Malik is a threat to the security of our nation, I
hope this Board will give due weight to these qualities
which have been consistently attested to by every person
who has encountered Abdul Malik. Further, as this Board is
by now well-aware, Abdul Malik will enjoy the programmatic
support of Reprieve's Life After Guantánamo project, which
provides a host of vital support mechanisms to help our
clients re-integrate into society. I am certain that
everyone - Abdul Malik, his representatives, and the United

161	States government - wants Abdul Malik to do well. I can			
162	assure the Board that the LAG project will do the same with			
163	Abdul Malik. We have traditionally worked with the State			
164	Department and host governments on transition plans for			
165	clients. Through the transition we have acted as a point			
166	of contact with local authorities and have facilitated			
167	support for job placement and mental health care. This			
168	will be no different for Abdul Malik, and we have already			
169	begun this work. I have personally spoken with a number o			
170	civil society organizations within Kenya, including the			
171	Inter-Medico Legal Unit, or IMLU, a Nairobi- based NGO			
172	that, in part, assists formerly incarcerated individuals			
173	reintegrate to society. They have noted that their			
174	services,	including psychological counseling, will be		
175	available to not only Abdul Malik, but his entire family,			
176	upon his return. I would like to close by quoting Abdul			
177	Malik, as he is surely a better advocate for his release			
178	than I am. He is fond of reminding people, when they are			
179	going th	rough a tough time: "your current situation is not		
180	your final destination." I hope this Board recognizes that			
181	it is time to change Abdul Malik's current situation, and			
182	allow hir	n to return to his family. Thank you for your		
183	considera	ation.
