All discussions or questions need to remain at the 9 UNCLASSIFIED level. [Pause] Rahim, during this hearing, you 10 have an opportunity to make a personal statement or answer 11 questions. Is it your choice whether to make a statement or to answer questions during this session. Do you understand 12 my explanation? 13 Detainee: Yes 14 HQ Translator: [Translates above] 15 16 Detainee: Yes, yes 17 PM: Rahim, are you planning on reading an opening statement? 18 HQ Translator: [Translates above] 19 Detainee: Yes. 20 PM: Rahim, you may now make a statement to the Board.

HQ Translator: [Translates above]

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compassionate, the most merciful. My naz-, name is Muhammad

Rahim. I want to begin by thanking you for this opportunity

Detainee: [Arabic] In the name of Allah, the most [pause]

to show you what I know in my hear-, my heart. That I pose
no threat to the United State or it is interest. I am not
an enemy to the United State. In the 1980s, Americans
assisted me and other Afghans against the Russian invaders.
[Pause] In the 1990s, I worked along the DEA and drug
eradication and assisted at the American Ambassador visit
to Jalalabad. I want to be clear, the terrible attack of
9/11 were act of Al-Qaida. The government and people of
Afghanistan did not and would never agree to [pause] attack
on civilians. Al-Qaida ushered in a generation of war,
pain, and death in which Americans, Afghans, and any others
suffered, so soon after the Russians were driven out of
Afghanistan. It led to many horror, horrors infli-,
inflicted on innocent people. There is long history of
conflict in Afghanistan, and equally a long history of
friendship emerging afterwards. As the United State become
friend and allies with Germany and Japan after World War
II, God-willing, the United State and Afghanistan will
become friends once again. I am the last Afghan in
Guantanamo, and I hope to be a small part of the process.
As a 57-years-old man in poor health, I am con-, confident
that the United State does not fear that I would return to
a battlefield that no longer exist. But I can understand
that you might fear what I would say if released. So I will

49	tell you the lesson I, the lesson I learned in Guantanamo.
50	First, from the violations I experienced, I learned the
51	importance of respecting the human rights of every man,
52	woman, boy, and girl. One of those human rights is
53	education. I have two daughters who graduated high school,
54	but could not attend college. I hope that Afghanistan will
55	open it is high schools and uni-, universities to girls and
56	women and soon as possible. Second, from my long
57	imprisment, imprisment, I learned the virtue of patience,
58	violence looks like an immediate solution, but in reality,
59	it only prolongs the suffering. At an Afghan jurga, where
60	conflicts are resolved, the people involved often wish they
61	had learned the le-, the lesson of peace earlier. In
62	Guantanamo, I have struggled with patience, and sometime
63	let my [pause] frustra-, uh, frustration get the better of
64	me. But I learned that every conflict can be resolved with,
65	uh, patience. Finally, from meeting hundreds of Americans,
66	I learned that the positive view of America I had as
67	[pause] as a young person was mostly justified. As you, as
68	a young person, virtually every book or agricultural
69	product I saw had it is origins in the United State. During
70	the darkest times of my capture, um, captivity, the biggest
71	shock was that Americans could be doing these thing, things
72	to me. But during these sixteen years in Guantanamo, I

73	learned that many of the Americans I inter-, interact with
74	have big heart and recip-, re-, uh, recipor-, reciprocate
75	kindness and respect. Not just attorney and personal
76	representatives, but also guards, officers, and medical
77	staff. I especially want to thank the medical staff who
78	treated me with kindness, respect, and humanity during my
79	recent hospility, hospit-, hospit-, hospitality stay.
во	[Pause] What would I do if eventually released? [Pause] I
B1	would pursue my love of cooking and hope to open a small
32	booth or food truck. We don't have much here, but it is
3 3	wonderful what one can accomplish with a microwave and a
84	passion for food. Sharing food is an experience that bring
35	people together, no matter where they are from. I know that
36	you have a job to do, to keep your country and families
87	safe. I appreciate you doing tha- that job, and hope you
38	understand that I am no threat to you or those that you
89	love. I humbly ask you to clear me for release, so that one
90	day I'm, I may return to those whom I love. Thank you.

92	PM: Rahim, you are not obligated to answer any questions posed
93	by the Board Members. Do you want to answer our questions?
94	GTMO Translator: [Begins translating above]
95	Detainee: Yes.
96	(Pause)

PM: Board members, please be mindful of the length of your 97 questions for translation and break them into segments as 98 99 necessary. 100 [Long Pause] 101 GTMO Translator: [Translates above] 102 Detainee: Not yet. [Pause] Yeah, yes, yeah. 103 PM: Well, lot mo, lot mo start by answering, or asking, a 104 question. Can you tell me about your relationship with your 105 brother in the United Kingdom? 106 GTMO Translator: [Translates above] 107 Detainee: Yes, uh my brothers, Zadran, he's in United Kingdom. 108 He came, he escaped from uh Pakistan and uh I think was uh 109 2013 and he lived there with uh his wife and three children and uh [pause] right now he's a taxi driver but he is my 110 111 really uh close uh brother because he was uh helping my, right now he's fel-, helping my family and uh my children 112 113 in their education, their food, clothes, everything he provides to my brother, and I respect and thank, thanks 114 115 him. 116 [Long Pause] 117 Okay well I'll ask another question. 209		the other question. Has there been a change in how you look
210		at America in the last year? Or since your first hearing,
211		2016? Or would you say that your views are pretty much the
212		same as they were in 2016 when you first spoke to this

224	America, no, but uh my nation and America because uh uh the
225	fighting finished. Right not we, we have, we have to become
226	friends uh and um America help uh the po-, po-, poor people
227	of Afghanistan uh and I ask you please you pass my message
228	to the big people uh to, to help the people of Afghanistan,
229	do not leave him uh alone, because you know uh there is a
230	lot of problem in Afghanistan. In se-, health sector, uh
231	education and everywhere. And uh this is my uh answer and
232	also there is a uh request uh for you. [Long Pause] Uh as
233	uh I mentioned in my statement uh about America there is,
234	uh, you know guards, guard force, we have very nice guards
235	and our uh lawyers and there is very it it is right the
236	black site if you, uh the the black site you put it
237	back. Do not think about because uh if anybody want to go
238	to the front they have to forget what is was in the past

239	and uh everybody if want to, to go to the front, and they
240	want to uh to build something, they have to forget what was
241	the troubling thing in in the past and they have to to
242	think about good ideas uh in uh in the future. Thank you

- 352 known about 9/11, but did you assist that group, Al-Qaida,
- 353 while you were in Afghanistan- in any, in any way, did you
- 354 assist Al-Qaida?

- 356 Detainee: Uh, you-, le-, uh [sigh], I I me-, mentioned in my uh
- 357 mentioned in my um statement I left, uh um worked with Al-

360		that day, my brother came to me and he told me, my-, our,

366		think was April or May my father passed away. And uh I
367		never uh helped anybody uh to attack in against uh um
368		America because there is no reason for that. Please ma-, uh
369		see. America assisted us against Russian and and 10 years I
370		were, we were [Unintelligible] in Peshawar. And uh this 10
371		years, we took food from America. Not just me. Millions of
372		Afghans. How Afghani did assist anybody to attack um uh
373		America? This is you know you you you uh Amer- America uh
374		um um accused Taliban also they help Amer-, Al-Qaida Al-
375		Qaida Al-Qaida, but never, the Taliban did that. If Taliban
376		known about it to they will attack America, they will at
377		that time will be finished it. Just was something happened,
378		and uh um there is no reason for uh to Afghani will be
379		against America. I don't think.

381	BM:	So if I could, just, I just want to make sure that, so
382		everything that you have ever told us, like this group,

it's all in this book right here in front of us, okay, so I 383 want to ask you like one question now. After 9/11, did you 384 385 go to Tora Bora with Al-Qaida? 386 GTMO Translator: [Translates above] 387 Detainee: No. Never. 388 [Pause] 389 Okay. Um so another question would be, [pause] so you understand that Al-Qaida was responsible for 9/11 and at 390 391 least some period of time you assisted Al-Qaida in 392 whatever, in whatever ways, we can agree on that. One thing 393 that I have not heard or seen, or I have not heard from you 394 is like, what, what regrets do you have, because you were 395 providing assistance to a group that attacked the United 396 States, killed thousands of people, I'm just wondering, do 397 you feel any regret for what you did? 398 GTMO Translator: [Starts to translates above] Support that you provided. 399 BM: GTMO Translator: [Translates above] 400 Detainee: Please you uh um [pause] talk with my attorney. He 401 402 will be list- little explain to you more. [Speaks with PC] 403 Okay okay okay uh I-, one minute here, I will, I will answer you. [Speaks with PC]. 404 405 [Long Pause]

406	PR:	He's just kind of further explaining the question, um, a
407		little clearer. We'll get it out here.
408	Detai	nee: Okay uh the first uh uh um, I not assisted uh uh Al-
409		Qaida, but I was interpreter, just interpreter. [Long
410		Pause] [speaks with PC]. And uh [Pause] just uh just I was
411		interpreter and from uh 1996 to 1999. This four years I was
412		there and uh [pause] uh the record is that was if for
413		example I understand Al-Qaida is doing like this, I will
414		fr-, not, uh, not did anything with them at that time.
415		Because-, but this is, was, my my problem because you know
416		the people of Afghanistan were poor people and we, when we
417		returned to Afghanistan uh in uh 1992 after fall of the
418		communist regime in Afghanistan and when um I get to
419		Afghanistan, there got to Afghanistan, there is no work and
420		um I had um big family. And there is was draught, because
421		no was rain, agriculture, everything was and I find uh um
422		the work with the uh Arabs and that I was nobody know who
423		is Al-Qaida because the Al-Qaida name in Afghanistan uh
424		after 9/11 the people known under the uh the name of Al-
425		Qaida but um the the big regret is not just me. I think the
426		Taliban, and the people of Afghanistan they all have
427		regretted why they give him uh shelter to to these people,
428		why they not control him, but this was the big mistake,
429		yes.

471		violence towards America in 2005, 2006 and your feelings of
472		violence against America now, are they the same?

475		I'm I don't have any any uh bad idea about United State. I
476		I I see him like our uh friends [Pause] if you believe it
477		or not this is your but uh I I there heres be a lot of

478		friends you know. I I make made made a lot of friends -
479		guards and um for example, uh officers, lawyers, and every-
480		, everybody would be inshallah come to visit us in uh visit
481		us in Afghanistan. We have big relation with the people and
482		I find before just I was hearing about about America from
483		my [Unintelligible] who who after my captivities and after
484		that I I shift the 16 years I'm in with uh Americans. And
485		after that uh ush uh that dark time for example in uh in a
486		black site, uh theres forget because we want to go uh
487		forward and uh we have to to forget that one. And in

488		inshallah we have to um build uh good relation with United
489		State.
490	BM:	Rahim, we appreciate your honesty with the board, we're,
491		I'm just trying to understand better. You seem to be saying
492		before your arrest, you did not feel violent, violent
493		thoughts or anger at America and now you do not feel
494		violent thoughts or anger at America. So it is the same?
495		Are you saying that? Or do I, do you want to change that?
496	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
497	Detai	inee: Yeah. [Speaks with PC]
498	PC:	I'm just explaining the nature of change in your questions.
499	BM:	If, if I could though, we really want to hear his opinion
500		on this. That's why we are asking HIM these questions,
501		please.

502	PC: Okay, sure. [Pause] Yes, sir.
503	Detainee: I never was in uh I I uh I'm not [Unintelligible]
504	before, I'm there is um maybe before you receive any wrong
505	information about me but I don't have any bad idea against
506	not before, not yet. I'm uh I'm uh uh hone- honestly I I I
507	say to you I don't have any uh bad idea about America.
508	BM: Thank you, Rahim. I have nothing else.
509	[Pause]
510	BM: To follow up on that. So [pause] do I have the right
511	understanding that your view is that you are [pause]
512	detained and brought to Guantanamo based on a mistake and
513	that you never have supported violence on behalf of Al-
514	Qaida or against the United States?
515	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
516	Detainee: Yes. Uh listen. I uh when um the war started in
517	Afghanistan in 2001, I was in uh in my village and uh
518	[pause] in Russian war time, we had there is uh, you know
519	killing between communist and Mujahideen and that that you
520	know. Okay. And at that time, I received there is uh in war
521	time, we killed between each other you know. Communist was
522	from our tribe or for example from our descent. And they
523	came back to to power at that time. And uh my family, my
524	friends, they told me you have to leave the village and go.
525	At that time, I refute to Pakistan, and uh I was when I

captured, I was in Peshawar and from Peshawar, I choose
Lahore because there is, I start to uh provide mm uh to
help my family because I start there is a small business
like uh something. And uh I was in Lahore and my children
they were in school. My sons, my daughters, my sis- uh
niece because my sister also in with me and I had a big uh
family my brothers, my brother's, um his children and I was
provide uh everything to my family this was and uh my uh my
uh responsibility. And when I captured, I captured with my
wife [pause] and my children and I not was in in the
fighting, uh for example in uh trench not in Tora Bora not
in Jalalabad not in [laughs]. I wasn't in, in Lahore. I
never got to Afghanistan in this duration. But I don't know
I why you do have for example why this idea against me
[laughs]. I feel I did, I never I never fou- fought with uh
coalition. Never. [Pause] If you want to for example, swear
see [Pause] this is my Quran in my hand. And Muslim, they
not swear uh for example on lying on Quran. I never f-,
never fought. But I uh this is my explanation on why, and
if there are any more questions, I I'm here. I explain to
you and uh until you clear your heart about uh about me
because this is. We have to talk.

549	BM: So I guess what we're struggling with, we have a lot of
550	information from many different you know statements about
551	what you were doing in Afghanistan, during the, that period
552	in 2000, 2001 and up until when you were detained that you
553	were uh more deeply involved in Al-Qaida then what you are
554	saying, alright. And that you did support violence
555	including against the United States so are, what my
556	understanding is you're saying is that is all false
557	information? Is that right, or is there some truth to it
558	that you want to explain?
559	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
560	Detainee: [Speaks with PC] Uh I don't know what you received.
561	What information? Can you explain to me? [Pause] Please?
562	[Pause]
563	BM: I can't provide specifics, but just you can assume we have
564	a lot of information that is different than how you're
565	characterizing your activity during that time, including
566	your involvement in Al-Qaida.
567	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
568	Detainee: Uh you know when I uh left Al-Qaida, in uh 1999,
569	after that, I cut everything out but just one thing I want
570	to explain, to you. In Jalalabad, there was Arab, they made
571	it Afghans, they were in fighting in uh against Russian
572	times, they were with us. And they made it from our village

and from for example [Unintelligible], they were in
Jalalabad and those people were coming to our village,
sometime they visit with the family because they fam-, wa-
wa-, wife were Afghani. And they were coming to our
village. And uh they were in Jalalabad, they had small
business like buy car and and passing to Peshawar and like
this I was helping with him, because they were afraid to
not anybody fight with him. And maybe the people give you
information about that, that people, those people. But
those people, [pause] never were Al-Qaida. They they were
from uh from Lib-, and uh Algeria and Tunisia, they come,
they were in in in Jihad time and they uh cannot go back
and they were in Jalalabad when uh 9/11 happened, they were
very unhappy, they say, Osama bin Laden destroyed our home.
They were crying, okay where will we go? They- but maybe
the people give you information about that, but when I
transferred to Pakistan, and I wer, was in in Lahore I
working, I was working there to uh help my family, I was
poor people. I I came to uh to to uh to provide uh to
family, something, how I can provide, to Mujahideen, to to
they fighting against America, I don't know but I, what I
can explain to you and um what I say to to you to um to
convince you this was the uh wrong information about about
me.

597	BM: The reason we ask these questions is not necessarily
598	[pause] um just to to talk again about what you did in the
599	past, but to uh get an understanding on whether you accept
600	any responsibility and whether your views have changed. So
601	it makes it more difficult for us to make that assessment
602	if we have information that contradicts um in many respects
603	the way you are characterizing what you did in Afghanistan,
604	so just want to clarify that on why I'm asking these
605	questions.
606	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
607	[Long Pause]
608	Detainee: [Speaks with PC] Okay. One thing I told you. You were
609	uh uh accused Taliban also, they help uh Al-Qaida you know,
610	and that's whats happened. You, you understand the Taliban
611	never did, tha- that but the mistake was the Taliban kept
612	uh Osama bin Laden but that uh that does not mean he was
613	the Taliban were against America. But Osama bin Laden or
614	Arabs they help Mujahideen and uh against Russian and
615	Afghan never forgot anybody to help him and then they uh um
516	uh [speaks with GTMO translator in Arabic].
617	GTMO Translator: Afghans are very loyal people, they will never
518	forget their favors that Americans helped us against the
519	Russians [Unintelligible].

620	Detainee: And uh this was not mean Osama bin Laden wanted
621	Afghanistan and Taliban uh help him to to uh at- attack
622	America. This will uh I I don't uh believe this idea. And
623	you understand. You and and and last you understand,
624	that the Taliban or Afghan are not Al-Qaida but Osama bin
625	Laden used land of Afghanistan but this was not, with uh
626	for example uh by help of Afghan, Afghans. This was one
627	mistake, and [pause] happened, was a big problem for
628	Afghans and for you too.
629	BM: So, in uh 1999 or 2000 or so, did you view yourself as more
630	supporting of the Taliban than Al-Qaida? Is that how you
631	are explaining your, your past conduct?
632	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
533	Detainee: And uh you know in in in fighting duration I never uh
634	side anybody. [Pause] I left Afghanistan for this. Because
635	you know uh in uh in the in this uh duration the fighting
636	time, my 5 uh uh cousins they killed in uh in our village,
537	the people killed him. Because [pause] uh I think Taliban
538	kill him they say they were working with uh with
539	government. [Pause] For this I I left Afghanistan and just
540	I I got my family's side. And I was in one side. For this,
541	when I captured and why I say and they we- um
542	beating me and I choose um to go to with Americans they
543	will be release me. Because there is no any reason but I I

544	don't know they about uh me uh, the people about him give
545	very wrong information. Like you, you are talking you say
546	for example, you help that that that, yes, this the the
547	information were they and that reason they they torture me
548	and uh black site one year, and then they send me
549	Guantanamo and 16 year, year in Guantanamo with any any
550	reason I don't know, please you think about this. How
551	Muhamad Rahim they help Al-Qaida they help Taliban too. I'm
552	not them-, I don't have any uh bi- big reason, uh source to
553	uh to to help the Taliban also and or Al-Qaida also against
554	America. I don't have any bank, I don't have any uh I have
555	small family. Uh I don't know my family was when I
556	captured, just I had, I swear by God I had five thousand
557	rupees, Pakistani rupees in my pocket and I said took from
558	me, I tell him okay please, just do not give it to my wife,
559	I uh I give to wife. [Pause] I poor guy, I don't know why
60	you uh thinking about me wrong uh.
61	BM: What is your view of the Taliban regime today and what
62	they're doing in Afghanistan?
63	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
64	Detainee: Okay. Like, uh same like you. Taliban [pause] uh you
65	cannot find any um [speaks with GTMO linguist in Arabic]
icc	CTMO Translator: Replacement for

667	Detainee: Replacement for Taliban, but you you have, we have to
668	push Taliban [pause] to open uh uh for example human rights
669	uh to open universities, school for girls if they in hijab,
670	and Islamic um education for example, with uh culture of
671	Afghanistan, yes but they have to open. Um but I know in
672	Afghanistan, you uh um the people of America they do not
673	read uh history but I am from Afghanistan. If there is an
674	Afghanistan not government that don't have stick, the
675	people don't believe uh government. You know 20 years the
676	democracy in Afghanistan in one building [laughs], one
677	side, of the lab, of the lab said I'm uh president, and the
678	other side [unintelligible] I am president. In this 20
679	years the government was divided between people. Panshir
680	was another uh presidency. There was another country.
681	Kandahar was [Unintelligible]. If there is no stick and uh
682	um strong um de-um head, that there is many problem and uh
683	I think there is no any um instant of Taliban any to to
684	bring another [Unintelligible] for example, if Taliban you
685	take him today who you bring again- again here? Same people
686	will be coming start again fight again but Taliban right
687	now. For example [unintelligible] they doing very nice job.
688	They stopped, cannot anybody in the in the one one feet in
689	Afghanistan cannot anybody to to grow uh any drug for
690	example opium, poppy, or for example hasish, or anything.

691	And uh also they control, there is can not anybody to for
692	example publish uh uh um to establish any training uh
693	center for example to attack anybody. Uh coun- um, Taliban
694	is promising that I think, but the the main problem is the
695	human rights like for example the the female and uh I think
696	if for example the uh Europe, when countries in the world,
697	they come to Taliban and they open the bases and they push
698	for example [speaks with GTMO translator in Arabic].
699	GTMO Translator: Political solution for all the
700	Detainee: Political solution for that. Because uh we
701	experienced fighting 20 years and I think will be enough.
702	And after that to me we have to, to uh uh the political
703	solution for to find a political solution for that.
704	[Pause]
705	BM: Okay, so my last question, going back to uh one of your
706	ideas, is to start a food truck um if you are transferred,
707	but if if you think about, ideally where would you like to
708	see yourself five years after being transferred, and you
709	know, how would you get to that to that um, you know where
710	would, you know ho- how, like whether it's a food truck or
711	something else, have you thought about, you know where you
712	would like to be you know five years after your transfer,
713	whether it's or some other country?
714	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]

715	Detainee: Okay, um please, I have I have uh a question for you.
716	Uh, have you know about my any uh report about my uh
717	health?
718	BM: We have information about your health.
719	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
720	Detainee: You, what you have please little, tell me about.
721	(Pause)
722	BM: Yeah, I don't, can you explain to me how that's relevant? I
723	was just trying to get a sense what you have in mind in
724	doing after you're transferred, like to get to where you
725	want to be five years after you're transferred, whether
726	it's operating a food truck or something else, like just
727	what your life plan would be and what you've thought about
728	in that regard?
729	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
730	Detainee: Okay, uh just I want to tell you about my health.
731	
732	
733	[speaks with GTMO translator].
734	GTMO Translator:
735	Detainee: I have uh five cases, maybe anytime.
736	the doctor told me, you have to be under uh
737	strong uh uh [speaks with GTMO translator in Arabic]
738	GTMO Translator: Watch for health

739	Detainee: Watch for health. And uh for example, if today you
740	release me and say to go to Afghanistan, I would choose
741	Guantanamo because right now um I am under focus under
742	doctor because all the time they do
743	
744	that will be detected.
745	And but I want to be in place, there is little uh because
746	in Afghanistan, there is, you know Afghanistan, like
747	desert, there is no any uh health uh something. I want to
748	be in a place there is uh for example if I want to stay and
749	after five years, I think I will be under [speaks with GTMO
750	translator in Arabic].
751	GTMO Translator: In my grave
752	Detainee: In my grave because this five uh cases I have. If
753	release me or not, I will die here [laughs] or I will go
754	there, I will die but not uh I will not stay long because I
755	have uh strong health problem. I talking with you right now
756	but I have a lot of problems. I cannot sleep or something
757	but hamdiallah.
758	[Long pause]
759	BM: Uh Rahim, you told uh you told us you were just an
760	interpreter for Al-Qaida. Can you help us understand what
761	it meant to be an interpreter? Did you help Al-Qaida people

762	talk to each other or help the people who were not Al-
763	Qaida?
764	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
765	Detainee: No my job was in uh city uh hospital for example
766	there is any uh ill, take them to hospital or for example
767	for uh grocery shopping in uh Kandahar city or in
768	Jalalabad, this is why my job. Uh maintenance of cars and
769	trucks, in uh in uh that was my job.
770	BM: Did you hear Al-Qaida talking among themselves about
771	America? Maybe?
772	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
773	Detainee: Uh no I I was uh out from the door, you know there is
774	was inside Arabs, outside interpreters or uh for example
775	the guards, Afghani drivers, they was outside. We were
776	outside. When they were coming, going to uh to shop-
777	shopping, they would come outside and we would take with
778	them and go to to uh, to the city for shopping. I never saw
779	him, they talking between uh each other and because they
780	were Arabs and Arabs with Arabs, don't need for uh to um
781	translation.
782	BM: Did you have any idea what Al-Qaida was?
783	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
784	Detainee: You know, Afghanistan, uh destroyed in Russia war,
785	and there is uh uh in Afghanistan nobody want [laughs] know

786	Al-Qaida just they known him as Arab Mujahadeen because
787	they stayed with [Unintelligible]. When 9/11 happened, the
788	people uh just heard from BBC, uh Pashtu service and wise
789	of America view um about Al-Qaida. They tracking Al-Qaida
790	and Osama bin Laden and uh at that time the people got
791	information in Arab about Al-Qaida, but uh before there is
792	no newspaper in Afghanistan, no television, no there was
793	like desert, there is very little information, very little
794	because just Arab Mujahideen and after 9/11 happened, the
795	uh um the people know Al-Qaida's um started the name of Al-
796	Qaida, but for Arabs.
797	[Pause]
798	BM: I'm asking, the people did not know, but you're you're
799	saying that you also did not know anything about Al-Qaida?
800	GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
801	Detainee: At that time, uh um that was the name of Al-Qaida,
802	just was Arab Mujahideen in in inside we never uh thought
803	they, they talking about for example they enemy for
804	anybody.
805	BM: Okay, thank you.
806	[Long Pause]
807	PM: Anybody else?
808	[Long Pause]

- 809 PM: That concludes questions for you from the Board Members.
- Rahim, a transcript of today's hearing may be posted to the

- 813 GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
- 814 Detainee: Think yeah, I want to publish everything, if they
- 815 broadcast right now is better.
- 816 PM: Personal Representative and Private Counsel, do you have
- 817 any final questions for Rahim?
- 818 PC: Yes sir, thank you.
- 819 Detainee: uh, yes
- 820 PM: Um, Personal Representative and Private Counsel, you may
- proceed with your questions for the detainee.
- 822 PC: Thank you. [Pause] Rahim, uh you were asked about
- interpreting uh for the group which became known as Al-
- 824 Qaida. What languages did you interpret between?
- 825 GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
- 826 Detainee: Arabic, Pashtu, Arabic.
- **827** [Pause]
- 828 PC: When, uh you also mentioned that there were inside people
- and there were outside people. Could you explain what you
- 830 meant?
- 831 GTMO Translator: [Translates above]

Detainee: The inside there, the Arab people were. And the 832 833 outside was for example, the labor like uh interpreter, driver, and uh uh guards they open the door and close the 834 835 door. And outside we had a group and we were there. [Pause] 836 And out, they mean outside, yes. 837 PC: Between 1996 and 1999 when you worked for the Arab 838 Mujahideen who [pause] were also called Al-Qaida. Did they 839 call themselves Al-Qaida? 840 GTMO Translator: [Translates above] Detainee: We never heard, heard this name at the time. 841 842 PC: When the people who are inside Al-Qaida um or the Arab Mujahideen spoke to each other, when the leadership spoke 843 844 to each other, what language did they speak to each other 845 in? 846 GTMO Translator: [Translates above] Detainee: I don't know, they were inside and outside, [laughs] 847 how I understand them? 848 849 [Pause] Detainee: [Unintelligible] 850 851 [Pause] PC: Did, [pause] did, was there any call for interpretation 852 into Pashtu uh by the inside people when they spoke to each 853 854 other? GTMO Translator: 855 [Translates above]

- 856 Detainee: Outside just when, when shopping or something like
- this, not between any person by person, no never like this.
- 858 PC: Okay, another topic. Rahim, have you ever personally
- 859 committed an act of violence against an American or
- 860 coalition member?
- 861 GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
- 862 Detainee: Never, not.
- 863 PC: Other than generally supporting the organization, did you
- have any role in the planning or execution of the attacks
- 865 on 9/11?
- 866 GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
- 867 Detainee: No, never I did, this was uh um uh [Arabic]
- 868 GTMO Translator: This was a calamity, if I knew, I wouldn't
- 869 have even say anything, but no I never helped them. I never
- 870 [Unintelligible].
- 871 PC: So is it fair to say you condemn the attacks on 9/11?
- 872 GTMO Translator: [Translates above]
- 873 Detainee: Of cour-, Sure, yes.
- 874 PC: New topic. Um, you mentioned um the [pause] uh importance
- 875 of the Taliban opening their educational system to girls
- and women. Uh, you have daughters, is that right?
- 877 Detainee: Yes, uh, I have two daughters and they pass high
- 878 school but they uh, they waiting for university and it
- 879 closed.

880	PC:	If the Taliban opened their university system to women,
881		would you support you daughters uh being educated in the
882		university system?
883	Deta	inee: Yes, this would be my first job to do it.
884	PC:	In 2020, the United States and the Taliban signed a peace
885		treaty, which was implemented in 2021. Do you support that
886		peace treaty?
887	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
888	Deta	inee: Very strongly.
889	PC:	You were asked a question um by one of the board members
890		about uh where you would like to be in 5 years, did, and
891		then you talked about health care. Um were you saying that
892		you would like to be in a country with an advanced health
893		care system?
894	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
895	Detai	inee: System, yes, yeah, because of I have strong health
896		problems.
897	PC:	And finally, have you had any disciplinary violations in
898		Camp 7 or Camp 5 in the last 5 years?
899	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
900	Detai	inee: No, never happened like this. I was friendly from
901		first uh, I don't know why they sometime they put
902		something, but not before 5 years, and from 16 years, I am

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very friendly with everybody.

904	PC:	So, in the last five years, you haven't had any
905		disciplinary violations? Is that correct?
906	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
907	Deta	inee: No, no, before, [unintelligible] after long time.
908	PC:	Thank you, no further questions Sir.
909	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
910	[Lon	g Pause]
911	PM:	Do members of the Board have any additional questions in
912		light of the Personal Representative or Private Counsel's
913		questions?
914	BM:	I just have one additional question.
915	PM:	Okay.
916	BM:	Rahim, you said that you uh had never uh conducted any acts
917		of violence against coalition or US forces, have you ever
918		told other people you committed acts of violence or hurt
919		people in coalition forces?
920	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
921	Deta	inee: Never, because I don't like to do wrong that. After,
922		after Russian invasion and uh they left Afghanistan and uh
923		uh the communist regime fell in Afghanistan, at that time I
924		put my [Unintelligible] on the floor and I never uh after
925		that did any any violence and not anybody to go fight or
926		anybody they enjoying with their, their wives, and they

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tur- turn the people, go you fight. This not equal you

927

928		know. I believe the people like this. I never did that.
929		[Pause] I don't like that.
930	[Pau	se]
931	BM:	Thank you. [Long Pause] Oh, I meant to ask this question
932		earlier, what is your view, what was your view of Osama bin
933		Laden?
934	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
935	Deta:	inee: Uh, you know Osama bin Laden was uh um a billionaire
936		of Soviet uh guy. And he came in nineteen uh uh eighties
937		and uh he spent million of uh dollars in on Mujahideen. And
938		they spent time, his time in in Afghanistan uh Mujahideen.
939		Everybody was uh respect him. There is nobody to say Osama
940		bin Laden bad guy but after 9/11, they did. They brought
941		catast-, catastrophe to Afghanistan and after that, don't
942		like him people because 50 years fighting, destroying
943		Afghanistan for one man, but this is was uh a big uh
944		problem for Afghans.
945	BM:	Right, you said they thought he was a bad guy after 9/11,
946		what did you think after 9/11?
947	GTMO	Translator: [Translates above]
948	Detai	inee: Yeah, this my idea, this is my uh my. I am talking
949		from my, uh me in Afghan, people also, but uh this is my
950		idea because uh uh this is uh not the wisest not um
951		solution for the problems, but uh we, when they they did

something, we left our village, our life of 16 years, year 952 953 and uh and the the problem fo- for they, this is uh not easy something too, for example, you forget that. This was 954 955 problem for [unintelligible] and they brought to 956 Afghanistan, to me and everybody. 957 [Pause] 958 BM: Okay. 959 [Long pause] 960 Anyone else? [long pause] Uh, Rahim, do you have anything 961 further you wish to say? 962 GTMO Translator: [Translates above] 963 Detainee: Thank you very much. If you have more questions, I 964 am, I am here. 965 Muhammad Rahim (ISN 10029), this concludes your 966 participation in this hearing. The Board will continue in a 967 classified session.
