Has the detainee 78 had an opportunity to review your statements? 79 **HQ** Translator: [Translates above] Yes, Sir. 80 PR: 81 PC: Yes, Sir. Personal Representative, please proceed. 82 PM: 83 HQ Translator: [Translates above] Mez, Members of the Board, thank you for the opportunity to 84 85 present this statement for Mohammad Rahim (ISN 10029). For 86 the past year Rahim has shown a complete commitment to the 87 PRB process. He routinely meets with myself and his new 88 Private Counsel, preparing for our meetings and presents us with fresh ideas and strategies on how to best present his 89 90 case. Outside of prepping for this hearing Rahim and I 91 routinely discuss current events, politics, family events, and occasionally we exchange jokes as well as impart some 92

wisdom on each other. While Rahim and I don't see eye to

eye on everything he has shown a great deal of respect and

| 95 | understanding on the topics where we do not agree. I have |

| 96 | also seen a change in his attitude on how Rahim views the |
| 97 | differences between the United States and Afghanistan. |
| 98 | During previous hearings I stated Rahim has the full |
| 99 | support from family members or members of his family. |
| 100 | Despite not having the time to provide letters of support |
| 101 | for this hearing the family has been in contact with |
| 102 | Rahim's Private Counsel still fully supporting Rahim and |
| 103 | can provide documentation on their willingness to assist |
| 104 | him. Finally, I cannot stress enough how on refreshing it |
| 105 | is to see Rahim's involvement, interest and sincerity while |
| 106 | preparing for this hearing. This is a much different Rahim |
| 107 | than the one who appeared in his past hearings. I trust |
| 108 | that you will see the difference that I have after today's |
| 109 | discussions addressing all of your concerns. Myself, Rahim |
| 110 | and his Private Counsel are here to answer any of your |
| 111 | questions. |

- 112 PM: Thank, Private Counsel please proceed.

- PC: My name is James Connell, Private Counsel for Muhammad

 Rahim. I have been traveling to Guantanamo since 2008, and

 have spent well over 500 days on the island. I have held a

 TS//SCI clearance for fourteen years, and have worked

| primarily for the Department of Defense since 2011. Of |
|---|
| course, I speak here only for myself and Rahim, nothing I |
| say is the official position of the Department of Defense. |
| Rahim is one of only three remaining Guantanamo detainees |
| who are neither charged in a military commission nor |
| cleared for release. Having met many current and former |
| Guantanamo detainees, I suggest that Rahim's position as |
| uncleared detainee is an anomaly, probably a result of the |
| circumstances which brought him here. As you know, Rahim |
| was the last prisoner transferred out of the Rendition, |
| Detention, and Interrogation Program to Guantanamo. But |
| Rahim is a poor candidate to be one of the last uncleared |
| detainees. Rahim is not alleged to have been directly |
| involved in 9/11 or any other attack on the United States |
| or its allies. Rahim is not alleged to have personally |
| committed any acts of violence against any person. In the |
| four current military commission cases, the Office of the |
| Chief Prosecutor has named nearly 100 co-conspirators in al |
| Qaeda attacks, not a single case names Rahim as a co- |
| conspirator, which casts significant doubt on the |
| allegation that Rahim played any significant role in al |
| Qaeda. The same factors which mean that Rahim will never be |
| charged with a crime support a determination that he does |
| not represent a threat to the United States. From my long- |

| time personal involvement with Guantanamo, and my personal |
|---|
| experiences with Rahim, I can offer three observations. |
| First, there are many sources of frustration at Camp 5, and |
| before it, Camp 7. Camp 7 was decrepit and plagued by many |
| physical problems that would anger any person, such as |
| sewage backup into the cells. Not long after the transfer |
| of Rahim and others to Camp 5, Camp 7 was condemned such |
| that no one is allowed to visit it even for documentation |
| purposes. Camp 5 has its own share of serious problems, |
| including HVAC issues which led to both high heat and |
| humidity and disruption of prison life during repairs. |
| Particularly for aging detainees with increasing health |
| problems like Rahim, such conditions can exacerbate sleep |
| issues and worsen their health, causing great frustration. |
| [Pause] Despite these challenges, Rahim has not had any |
| serious disciplinary issues for well over five years. |
| Second, I have personally visited Rahim's brother and |
| respectfully suggest that concerns about him are misplaced. |
| I visited his home, spoke to him for hours, and shared a |
| meal with him. He lives a humble and respectable life. But |
| he also lives a life designed to give authorities no cause |
| for concern. I did not observe anything that would weigh |
| negatively against Rahim or his family, but rather the |
| opposite. Rahim's brother is a person who can be relied |

| 166 | upon to help Rahim live a productive life after release, |

| 167 | assuming that the United States eventually decides to |
| 168 | release Rahim to a country with security and safety |
| 169 | guarantees. Third, and on a lighter note, it has been my |
| 170 | privilege to eat food prepared by many of the men in Camp 7 |
| 171 | and now in Camp 5. I can tell you that Rahim is the best |
| 172 | cook among a field of good cooks. Working with limited |
| 173 | equipment and supplies, Rahim prepares a wonderful array of |
| 174 | dishes drawing on a range of cuisines. His spinach curry is |
| 175 | the best anywhere. After release, if Rahim has a food truck |
| 176 | or restaurant, I can tell you that I would be first in |
| 177 | line. With the benefit of contact with many Guantanamo |
| 178 | detainees over the year, years, I am confident that the |
| 179 | care and hospitality that Rahim puts into sharing his food |
| 180 | with us, and even those he doesn't know well, reflects his |
| 181 | sincere desire to build relationships without |
| 182 | discrimination. If cleared, Rahim will seek resettlement in |
| 183 | a country that can offer both modern health care and |
| 184 | appropriate guarantees of safety and security. Thank you. |
