8	CA: Representatives from the following agencies are present and
9	are members of the Board: Department of Defense,
10	Department of State, Department of Justice, Department of
11	Homeland Security, Office of the Director of National
12	Intelligence, and the Office of the Chairman of the Joint
13	Chiefs of Staff. The following personnel are also present:
14	Legal Advisor to the Board, Case Administrators, Personal
15	Representative, Private Counsel, and the Security Officer
16	DC Translator: [Translates above]
17	CA: The detainee's Personal Representative is located at the
18	detention facility, U.S. Naval Station Guantanamo Bay,
19	Cuba. The Personal Representative is attending via video
20	teleconference. The Private Counsel is also attending via
21	video teleconference due to COVID logistical challenges.
22	The detainee has chosen not to attend. The class-the
23	unclassified summary has been posted to the Periodic Review
24	Secretariat website. Foreign, national and local media,
25	Foreign Government Officials, and Representatives from Non-
26	Governmental Organizations may be observing this session.
27	PM: This Board is convened to determine whether continued law
28	of war detention is warranted for Mohammed Ahmad Rabbani
29	(ISN 1461) to protect against a continuing significant
30	threat to the security of the United States. This session
21	of the hearing is unclassified

32	PM:	Personal Representative, has the detainee had an
33		opportunity to review the Unclassified Summary?
34	PR:	Yes, he has Sir.
35	PM:	Thank you. I will now read the UNCLASSIFIED SUMMARY:
36		Mohammed Ahmad Rabbani (ISN 1461), a.k.a. Abu Badr, was a
37		financial and travel facilitator for al-Qa'ida leader
38		Khalid Shaykh Muhammad (ISN 10024) and USS Cole mastermind
39		'Abd al-Rahim al-Nashiri from 1997 until his arrest in
40		September 2002 during a raid of guest houses in which
41		Mohammed Ahmad Rabbani with his brother Abdul Rabbani (ISN
42		1460) were detained in Karachi, Pakistan. Mohammed Ahmad
43		Rabbani's primary jobs were to operate al-Qa'ida safe
44		houses in Karachi, facilitate travel of mujahidin and their
45		families to and from Afghanistan, and acquire and drive
46		vehicles. Mohammed Ahmad Rabbani lived in Saudi Arabia
47		until his early 20s but spent his active jihadist years in
48		Pakistan.
49	PM:	Does the Personal Representative wish to make an
50		unclassified Opening Statement at this time?
51	PR:	Yes, Sir.
52	PM:	I would like to remind all participants that any
53		information shared at this time must be unclassified. If
54		there is a concern about the classification of the
55		information, I will indicate as such and will stop the
56		proceedings until we resolve the issue. Has the detainee
57		had the opportunity to review your statement?
58	PR:	He has Sir.
59	PM:	Personal Representative, you may now proceed.
60	PR:	Board Members, thank you for the opportunity to provide a
61		statement on behalf of Mr. Rabbani. I'd like to also thank
62		the board for allowing this accelerated hearing based on
63		the last file review of Mr. Rabbani's case. I ask that the

64		Board carefully consider the information in the statements
65		of the Private Counsel, as well as statements presented
66		from other interested parties. I will do my best in this
67		hearing to provide necessary information to the Board in
68		evaluating whether Mr. Rabbani is a continuing threat to
69		the United States, with hopes that he may be found eligible
70		for transfer from Guantanamo. Thank you.
71	PM:	Thank you. Due to the current global health pandemic, the
72		Private Counsel has been unable to travel to Guantanamo Bay
73		and participate in the unclassified portion of this
74		hearing. As a result, the Personal Representative will now
75		read the Private Counsel's opening statement. However, the
76		Private Counsel will subsequently be available for
77		classified discussions with the Board today.
78	PR:	On behalf of the Private Counsel, will read a statement.
79		Dear Periodic Review Board Members, I am the founder of the
80		London-based charity, Reprieve. I have represented Ahmed
81		Rabbani pro bona for more than ten years and got to know
82		him and his family very well. It is my privilege to write
83		to you on behalf of Mr. Rabbani respectfully requesting his
84		clearance at the hearing on August 17th. A brief
85		background - I am a member of the Louisiana and Supreme
86		Court bars, and have spent my entire career working for
87		charity. I spent nine years with the Southern Center for
88		Human Rights doing civil rights work, and then founded a
89		charitable law office in New Orleans, where I spent eleven
90		years trying capital cases for indigent persons. I have
91		been fortunate enough to receive more awards than I merit,
92		including the Gandhi Peace Prize and an OBE bestowed by Her
93		Majesty the Queen for "services to humanity". I briefly
94		outline this background only to illustrate that my whole
95		career has been motivated by an intense pride in our

96	Constitution. I am sure you also work daily to see the
97	promise of that wonderful document fulfilled. I have
98	represented many clients facing execution, or detention in
99	Guantanamo. I dare say that no client in my four decades of
100	practice has suffered quite as acutely as Mr. Rabbani. Much
101	of the paperwork before this Board outlines the history of
102	Mr. Rabbani's case, but I would like to highlight a number
103	of issues with which this Board may be unfamiliar, which
104	will emphasize who he is and what he has been through.
105	First, I should note that the Pakistan government has filed
106	a letter from a cabinet minister, Shahzad Akbar, in support
107	of Mr. Rabbani. I have known Mr. Akbar for many years as a
108	highly respected human rights lawyer himself, and I have
109	been in discussions with him and with the Prime Minister of
110	Pakistan, Imran Khan, who I have also known personally for
111	years. Their support for their citizen is rare for a
112	government, but it is also critically important. It means
113	that we -you and I -can depend on both of them to work
114	closely with us, and with Reprieve staff, to ensure that
115	Mr. Rabbani integrates swiftly and safely back into
116	Pakistan society. It is also significant that an important
117	ally like Pakistan is strongly urging us to repatriate
118	their citizen. Resolving his case is also particularly
119	urgent given his declining physical and mental health. Mr.
120	Rabbani was originally detained when turned over to the
121	U.S. by corrupt Pakistanis who hoped for rewards, who
122	falsely said he was a terrorist called Hassan Ghul. At the
123	time, Mr. Rabbani was at his home in Karachi, which the
124	Board will know is 1,000 kilometers from the battlefields
125	of Afghanistan. The bounties were being used a great deal
126	in Pakistan, as noted in General Musharraf's autobiography,
127	In the line of Fire, where he says that more than 300

people were turned over for money. Much of Mr. Rabbani's
version of events is further corroborated in the 2014 U.S.
Senate Report that deals specifically with this case and
says that "enhanced interrogation techniques" (EITs) were
used on him "without authorization". Remarkably, the Report
revealed to us that Hassan Ghul was captured while Mr.
Rabbani was in custody and brought to the same prison as
Mr. Rabbani. Ghul was released back to Pakistan, where he
went back to his wicked ways, and was killed in a drone
strike in 2012. Mr. Rabbani, meanwhile, was sent to
Guantanamo where he remains 19 years later. What saddens
Mr. Rabbani more than anything is that, when he was
abducted by the Pakistanis in September 2002, he did not
know his wife was pregnant. She later gave birth to his son
who has written to you separately. While Mr. Rabbani
has never met his child, who is now 17, I have met him on
my trips to Pakistan. I can confirm that the only thing the
family wants is to have Mr. Rabbani home so he can help
support them, and help achieve his son's goal of becoming a
lawyer (inspired by none other than Abraham Lincoln). In
addition to helping Mr. Rabbani, we have been trying to
support his son's educational goals, as there is nothing I
feel we can do that will more effectively ensure that he
gets into a positive career. He is a good kid, and I know
that he will do well. I know that the Board prefers to
look forward rather than backwards, and I will not address
in detail the assertions that have been made against Mr.
Rabbani over the years. However, even if we accepted them,
the simple fact is that many of the allegations against
Ahmed deal with events that occurred over 20 years ago at
this point. I do wish to make one point - one important
point here: the military commissions prosecutors were

160	willing to facilitate his return to Pakistan if he
161	testified against one of the High Value Detainees in the
162	commissions, and we (the defense team) spent a considerable
163	time debriefing Mr. Rabbani with them. Mr. Rabbani made
164	every effort to cooperate over many days. The problem we
165	encountered was that Mr. Rabbani said he could not repeat
166	the statements the prosecutors wanted to hear, because they
167	were falsehoods extracted from him when the EITs were being
168	used on him. He had no problem -he wanted to -and he knew
169	that if he repeated the lies he had told, he would go home.
170	I think we can agree that it speaks volumes about his
171	honesty that he would not repeat an untruth even though it
172	would set him free. Mr. Rabbani's health is in a dangerous
173	state. Part of this is brought on by a long term peaceful
174	hunger strike. While people may differ on the propriety of
175	a hunger strike, I can assure the Board that he is
176	motivated only by a desire for justice and he only
177	committed to it after losing patience, more than ten years
178	into his detention. He was heavier when originally turned
179	over by the Pakistani authorities. He is now significantly
180	under half that weight. He experiences difficulty, and he
181	suffers other serious medical conditions. As attested to by
182	the statement by a medical doctor, Mr. Rabbani is in
183	significant medical danger. I fear that without an
184	immediate resolution of his case, and repatriation to
185	Pakistan where he can receive proper care that Mr. Rabbani
186	may perish in Guantanamo, which would be a tragedy and
187	would cause our country significant embarrassment with a
188	close ally. He has also suffered mentally, and we will
189	ensure that he - when he gets home he will get the therapy
190	that he needs. Regardless, as a testament to Mr. Rabbani's
191	positive spirit, he has used his time in Guantanamo

192		productively. You are likely aware of his artwork, which
193		itself is extraordinary. I am currently working with Fatima
194		Bhutto, granddaughter of the former prime minister, on an
195		art show that will include, and be inspired by, Mr.
196		Rabbani's works. We have used his talent for art as a kind
197		of [sound cuts out]
198	CA:	GTMO, sound check. Can you hear us?
199	PR:	Presiding Member, shall I continue?
200	PM:	Yes, please.
201	PR:	He has also suffered mentally, and we will ensure that he
202		gets home he will get the therapy that he needs.
203		Regardless, as a testament to Mr. Rabbani's positive
204		spirit, he has used his time in Guantanamo productively.
205		You are likely aware of his artwork, which itself is
206		extraordinary. I am currently working with Fatima Bhutto,
207		granddaughter of the former prime minister, on an art show
208		that will include, and be inspired by, Mr. Rabbani's works.
209		We have used his talent for art as a kind therapy for him,
210		and I like to think it has helped. He has a second very
211		positive outlet, which is a very clear goal for his future.
212		His true dream is to run a restaurant and put his passion
213		for cooking into action. We have therefore been working on
214		a cookbook. Mr. Rabbani was a professional cook before his
215		detention and has spent the last year adapting some of his
216		older recipes. It is all the more remarkable that he does
217		this with his digestive problems. Far from giving in to
218		despair, Mr. Rabbani's devotion to this project
219		demonstrates that he will be successful upon release. I
220		shall certainly help him publish his cook book, and if it
221		makes any money that will help both his son's education and
222		with establishing his little restaurant in Karachi. This
223		cookbook is a very realistic project, and I suspect he will

224	sell more copies than I ever do of my books! I have spent
225	the last few weeks sharing his recipes with various
226	professional chefs, who have been testing them, and
227	offering suggestions. This process has been rather mouth-
228	watering, as they send me pictures of some delicious
229	dishes. Overwhelmingly, their responses have been positive,
230	and they have assured me that they will help him promote
231	his talents as a chef upon release. Mr. Rabbani has also
232	freely volunteered to submit to "security arrangements"
233	upon his return home. This is something Reprieve has helped
234	facilitate in other cases. It is, in our view, not
235	necessary in any meaningful sense, as we will work closely
236	with Mr. Rabbani to reintegrate him into society, and he
237	will be one of our easiest and most cooperative clients
238	upon his release. However, it allows both the Board and the
239	government of Pakistan additional assurance that all will
240	be well on his repatriation. I would be remiss if I did
241	not note the significant political changes that have
242	occurred that affect Mr. Rabbani's approach to the Board.
243	When he last appeared before the Board, it was under a
244	President who had made clear that there would be no new
245	transfers from Guantanamo. Mr. Rabbani, along with other
246	detainees, is certainly aware of the recent statements by
247	Secretary of Defense, during his confirmation hearing:
248	Quote: "If confirmed, I would reinvigorate the review
249	process using available information to determine whether a
250	detainee no longer poses a continuing significant threat to
251	the security of the United States and whether there is a
252	suitable country to which to transfer such a detainee. The
253	Periodic Review Board Process is currently the best means
254	available for making such determinations in a systematic
255	manner. If the PRB process concludes that the threat from

256		individual detainees may be sufficiently mitigated, then
257		the U.S. Government should identify options for the
258		transfer of such detainees to other countries that have
259		provided credible security assurances in accordance with
260		applicable legal and policy requirements." End quote.
261		These statements reveal the new administration's commitment
262		to a fulsome review of a detainee's continuing status. I
263		have discussed this with Mr. Rabbani and he very much
264		wishes to take part in the review - so long as his mental
265		and physical health permits, he will do so in person;
266		regardless, I will do so on his behalf. Finally, on a
267		personal note, I would like to emphasize that it is truly
268		an honor to appear before this Board on behalf of Mr.
269		Rabbani. Over the many years I have represented him, I have
270		come to know him quite well. He is a thoughtful, kind, and
271		funny man, whose greatest aim in life is to care for his
272		family - and to cook excellent meals to be enjoyed by
273		others. Read on behalf of the Private Counsel.
274	PM:	Board Members may reserve questions until all statements
275		have been presented in their entirety. However, does anyone
276		have any questions at this time?
277	PM:	Okay. With no further questions, this concludes this
278		portion of the hearing. I ask that all remain seated until
279		further instructed by the Case Administrator.
280	CA:	We will now take a short recess to prepare for the
281		remaining sessions. Time now 0927.
