8	CA: Representatives from the following agencies are present and
9	are members of the Board: Department of Defense,
10	Department of State, Department of Justice, Department of
11	Homeland Security, Office of the Director of National
12	Intelligence, and the Office of the Chairman of the Joint
13	Chiefs of Staff. The following personnel are also present:
14	Legal Advisor to the Board, Case Administrators, Personal
15	Representative, Private Counsel, Translators, the detainee
16	and the Security Officer.
17	HQ Translator: Translates above.
18	CA: The detainee's Personal Representative, Private Counsel,
19	the detainee, and translator are located at the detention
20	facility, U.S. Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. They
21	are attending via video teleconference. The detainee has
22	waived translation of the unclassified summary, the
23	Personal Representative's statement and the Private
24	Counsel's statement. The unclassified summary has been
25	posted to the Periodic Review Secretariat website. Foreign,
26	national and local media, Foreign Government Officials, and
27	Representatives from Non-Governmental Organizations may be
28	observing this session.
29	HQ Translator: Translates above.
30	PM: This Board is convened to determine whether continued law
31	of war detention is warranted for Khalid Ahmed Qasim (ISN
32	242) to protect against a continuing significant threat to

33 the security of the United States. From here on forward, we 34 will refer to the detainee as Khalid. This session of the 35 hearing is unclassified. 36 HQ Translator: Translates above. 37 PM: Khalid, this is your Periodic Review Board to determine whether continued law of war detention is warranted in your 38 case. Continued law of war detention will be warranted if 39 40 it is necessary to protect against a continuing significant threat to the security of the United States. The focus of 41 this hearing is on the threat you may pose to the United 42 States and its interests if transferred or released from 43 U.S. custody. It is not on the lawfulness of your 44 detention. 45 46 HQ Translator: Translates above. PM: The Personal Representative and Private Counsel are your 47 representatives to assist you during this process. Finally, 48 the translators ensure that everyone understands 49 your statements and that you understand what is being said 50 51 during the hearing. HQ Translator: Translates above. 52 PM: Personal Representative and Private Counsel, has the 53 detainee had an opportunity to review the Unclassified 54 55 Summary? HQ Translator: Translates above. 56 PR/PC: Yes, Sir. 57 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 58 59 PM: Thank you. I will now read the UNCLASSIFIED SUMMARY: 60 Khalid Ahmed Qasim (ISN-242) received basic and advanced instruction at the al-Qa'ida affiliated al-Faroug training 61 camp before 9/11, possibly provided weapons training to 62 militants, and may have fought for the Taliban in or near 63 Bagram and Kabul in Afghanistan before fleeing to the Tora 64

65	Bora mountains in late 2001. While he was in Afghanistan,
66	Qasim was closely affiliated with al-Qa'ida, briefly met
67	Usama Bin Ladin at Tora Bora, and possibly became a member
68	of al-Qa'ida, although during debriefings he has denied
69	joining the group, and we have no reporting that he swore
70	allegiance to Bin Ladin. He was captured while fleeing the
71	Tora Bora Mountains near Jalalabad, Afghanistan. Does the
72	Personal Representative wish to make unclassified Opening
73	Statement at this time?
74	HQ Translator: Translates above.
75	PR: Yes, Sir.

77	PM: I would like to remind all participants that any
78	information shared at this time must be unclassified. If
79	there is a concern about the classification of the
80	information, I will indicate as such and will stop the
81	proceedings until it is resolved. Has the detainee had the
82	opportunity to review your statements?
83	HQ Translator: Translates above.
84	PR: Yes, Sir.
85	PC: Yes, Sir.
86	PM: Person Personal Representative, please proceed.
87	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
88	PR: Good morning members of the board, I am the Personal
89	Representative for Mr. Khalid Ahmed Qasim, ISN 242. Khalid
90	has not been a regular participant in this review process
91	though we continue to engage him through meeting requests
92	letters in an effort to maintain contact and provide
93	preparation for the board process. While in detention,
93 94	preparation for the board process. While in detention, Khalid has taken advantage of available educational

97	English without the use of an interpreter. Khalid has
98	shown an appreciation for art and modeling. He passes his
99	time painting, sketching and creating three dimensional
100	models while in detention. With the continued support of
101	his legal team and post Guantanamo Bay reintegration
102	organizations, Khalid has the tools available to him to
103	facilitate his transition following detention. Thank you
104	for your careful deliberation and allowing this opportunity
105	to appear before the
106	PM: Private Counsel you may proceed.
107	HQ Translator: Translates above.
108	PC: Periodic Review Board Members, this statement is being
109	submitted jointly on behalf of Khalid Qasim's counsel, Shelby
110	Sullivan- Bennis, Thomas Wilner, and Mark Maher. It is our
111	privilege to represent Khalid in this process and we would like
112	to express our appreciation for the Board's willingness to
113	expedite this hearing. Together, we have represented Khalid
114	Qasim for many years and have come to know him very well. We
115	would like to use this statement as opportunity to tell the
116	Board a little about who Khalid is today, and why we believe he
117	will be successful upon release from Guantánamo. With an eye to
118	the future, it is worth describing the person that we have come
119	to know. Far from being any threat to the United States, Khalid
120	is a thoughtful and kind man, who has developed into a gifted
121	artist and writer. His humor and kindness are clear to all who
122	have met and interacted with him. Each of us has been struck by
123	how relaxed every meeting with Khalid is. Instead of a focus on
124	his case, the circumstances of his incarceration, or the past,
125	he is more often focused on knowing how his attorneys are-
126	learning about their families, their health, and their faith—and
127	looking toward the future. Khalid has used his time at
128	Guantánamo positively, developing talents and skills useful for

129	his future life in society. Although he is never boastful,
130	Khalid is an astonishingly talented artist. His work is varied-
131	he is adept at using various mediums, and his subjects have
132	ranged from simple words against solid backgrounds to large,
133	complex displays. He has a keen understanding of light
134	and can paint incredibly effective works with very few colors.
135	Ever the hard worker, Khalid is not content with these
136	accomplishments, and frequently expresses his desire to learn
137	more and hone his skills when he is released. The fact that
138	Khalid could develop into such an accomplished artist while
139	incarcerated indicates that when he is a free man, his skills
140	will only increase. Similarly, Khalid arrived in Guantánamo
141	unable to recognize the English language and is now a fluent
142	speaker. He is not only able to speak about himself and his
143	case with ease, but poetically articulates his opinions on a
144	range of topics. His written thoughts are often full of
145	beautiful or funny turns of phrase and alliteration. It is
146	always a joy to receive a letter or call from Khalid.
147	These facts are not just admirable in themselves, they
148	demonstrate that Khalid has a real future ahead of him. Khalid
149	entered Guantánamo as one of the youngest detainees and will
150	leave with plenty of life left to live. His mastery of an art
151	form and a language and his engagement with classes in
152	Guantánamo demonstrate that he is devoted to self-improvement.
153	We believe that upon release he will not only live, but will
154	thrive. Khalid will not be alone in this endeavor. While his
155	ultimate destination is not clear, he will continue to enjoy the
156	support of his counsel, Reprieve's Life After Guantánamo
157	Project, and his family. The statements before this Board
158	demonstrate just how much Khalid's family and friends are ready
159	and willing to support him upon release. Finally, it would be
160	inappropriate to not remark on the length of Khalid's detention.

He has been incarcerated for nearly 20 years, and like any 161 person, he is certainly not the same twenty-something that 162 entered Guantánamo, but a matured and educated man. He does not 163 look back in bitterness. Rather, he looks positively to the 164 future. The Khalid we know is a wise and caring man, who wants 165 nothing more than to live a fulfilling life, work at a job, 166 raise a family, and of course, paint. We hope that this Board 167 168 will see fit to give him this opportunity. 169 PM: Board Members may reserve questions until detainee and 170 witness statements have been presented in their entirety. However, does anyone have any questions at this particular 171 172 time? 173 HO Translator: Translates above. 174 PM: With no questions, this concludes this portion of the 175 hearing. I ask that all remain seated until further instructed by the Case Administrator. 176 HO Translator: Translates above. 177 CA: We will take a short recess to prepare for the remaining 178
