HQ Translator: [Translates above] 36 37 PM: Khalid, this is your Periodic Review Board to determine whether continued law of war detention is warranted in your 38 case. Continued law of war detention will be warranted if 39 it is necessary to protect against a continuing significant 40 41 threat to the security of the United States. The focus of 42 this hearing is on the threat you may pose to the United States and its interests if transferred or released from 43 U.S. custody. It is not on the lawfulness of your 44 45 detention. 46 HQ Translator: [Translates above] 47 The Personal Representative and Private Counsel are your 48 representatives to assist you during this process. I will now read the UNCLASSIFIED SUMMARY: Khalid Ahmed Qasim (ISN-242) received basic and advanced 60 61 instruction at the al-Qa'ida affiliated al-Faroug training 62 camp before 9/11, possibly provided weapons training to militants, and may have fought for the Taliban in or near 63 Bagram and Kabul in Afghanistan before fleeing to the Tora 64

65 Bora Mountains in late 2001. While Qasim was in 66 Afghanistan, he was closely affiliated with al-Qa'ida, 67 briefly met Usama Bin Ladin in Tora Bora, and possibly 68 became a member of al-Qa'ida, although during debriefings 69 he has denied joining the group, and we have no reporting 70 that he swore allegiance to Bin Ladin. He was captured 71 while fleeing Tora Bora near Jalalabad. 72 73 Does the Personal Representative or Private Counsel wish to 74 make unclassified Opening Statement at this time? Khalid was eager to prepare for today's board and is ready to answer any of your questions. 96

| 99 | | English since he arrived in Guantanamo, and we have |
| 100 | | conducted meetings without the need for translation. |
| 101 | | Throughout our meetings, Khalid has reflected on his |
| 102 | | progress over the past year. He has made positive |
| 103 | | behavioral changes, largely due to his own efforts in |
| 104 | | recognizing his stressors and process ways to deal with |
| 105 | | them. He has identified his artwork as a key means of both |
| 106 | | expression and of coping with the challenges of his |

| 136 | comments brief, and will try to avoid repeating information |
| 137 | this Board has already heard but I would be doing Khalid a |
| 138 | disservice if I did not briefly repeat what I, and each of |
| 139 | his representatives, has said time and again: Khalid is a |
| 140 | good man, with a lot to offer this world. I can say on |
| 141 | behalf of all of his counsel who have represented him for |
| 142 | well over a decade that Khalid is an extraordinarily |
| 143 | thoughtful, kind, and funny man and he is humble too. |

| 145 | After his last Board, Khalid turned to me and quietly said |
| 146 | that I had said too much, that my statement was too |
| 147 | complimentary. It was amazing to me that, with his freedom |
| 148 | on the line, Khalid was concerned first with being talked |
| 149 | about too positively but I can assure you all, and Khalid |
| 150 | as well, that everything I've said before is true. He is |
| 151 | truly a fast learner and a uniquely talented artist. He |
| 152 | perseveres no matter how many roadblocks are put in his |
| 153 | way. When I and my co-counsel told him about his most- |
| 154 | recent denial, he took the bad news in stride, thanked his |
| 155 | counsel for our assistance, and immediately worked with us |
| 156 | to plan for the next few months. Khalid approaches each new |

While I do not think Khalid suffers from any mental disorder that would make him a threat to anyone, I do understand that counselling is valuable for everyone, and particularly important for the formerly incarcerated. With that in mind, we have identified and presented to this Board multiple providers who have represented that they will provide Khalid with care when he is released, free of charge, regardless of where he is resettled.

We have likewise identified a number of work and educational opportunities in some of the locations where Khalid may be resettled. Of course, it is impossible to say exactly what work Khalid will do since his ultimate destination is still very unclear, but I hope the Board is satisfied that there are many options for employment, and we will work with Khalid to make sure he is able to support himself.

On this point, I would like to emphasize again that Khalid entered Guantánamo as one of the youngest detainees, and will leave with plenty of life left to live. And he has used his time wisely, mastering an art form and a language, and engaging with classes in Guantánamo. He is obviously devoted to self-improvement and I believe that he will thrive when he is released. I am excited to be one of many people supporting him in this journey.

Finally, it would inappropriate to not again remark on the length of Khalid's detention. He has been incarcerated for nearly 20 years, and like any person he is certainly not the same twenty something that entered Guantánamo. The Khalid I know is a good man, who is ready to work, study, start a family, and of course paint. I hope that this Board
