34		3148) to protect against a continuing significant threat to
35		the security of the United States. From here on forward we
36		will refer to the detainee as Asad.

61		al-Afghani (ISN 3148) was a Hezb-e Islami Gulbuddin (HIG)
62		commander who organized and led attacks against coalition

forces in Afghanistan and served as a link between senior

64	Al-Qaeda members and the anti-coalition fighters. He was a
65	courier for Al-Qaeda military commander 'Abd al-Hadi al-
66	Iraqi (ISN-10026) until 2003 or 2004. Afghani was arrested
67	along with other HIG associates in 2007, according to
68	Afghan authorities. Does the Personal Representative wish
69	to make unclassified Opening Statement at this time?

73	PM: I would like to remind all participants that any
74	information shared at this time must be unclassified. If
75	there is a concern about the classification of the
76	information, I will indicate as such and will stop the
77	proceedings until we resolve the issue.

86	PR: Honorable Board Members, thank you for the opportunity to
87	provide a statement on behalf of Mr. al-Afghani in hopes of
88	securing a recommendation for transfer from Guantanamo Bay
89	Despite receiving a negative result from his last hearing,
90	Mr. al-Afghani continues to express hope in the PRB
91	process. He has stressed that his only desire is to be
92	reunited with his family in order to live a peaceful life.
93	As the sole Afghan in his section of detention, he feels
94	isolated and cut off from his culture and language. In
95	addition, the group that Mr. al-Afghani fully admits to

96 having been a member of, Hezb-i-Islami Afghanistan (HIA). 97 is now actively part of the peace process in Afghanistan. 98 Through our discussions, he is confident that a 99 recommendation for transfer from Guantanamo Bay would only serve to enhance that process. With the current situation 100 101 in Afghanistan, I am confident that he is now more eager 102 than ever to once again be a part of the lives of his wife 103 and daughter and would very much appreciate a favorable 104 recommendation from the board. Based on our interactions. 105 I have not seen any indications that he is a continuing threat to the United States or its allies. Thank you for 106 107 your time and consideration. 108 Private Counsel you may now proceed. 109 DC Translator: Translates above. 110 Periodic Review Board Members. My name is Mark Maher. 111 is my privilege to represent Asadullah Haroon Gul before 112 this board today. Over the past five years, the lawyers at 113 Reprieve and our pro bono, pro bono colleagues at Lewis Baach Kaufmann Middlemiss have come to know Asadullah very 114 115 well. Based on that long experience, I can say a few

116 things about him without reservation. First, Asadullah is an intelligent, warm-hearted, and thoughtful man. After 117 118 all this time, his focus is on returning to his family and to help his daughter receive a proper education and to live 119 the best life she possibly can. As the materials before 120 121 this Board demonstrate, the support of his family and 122 community, and his devotion to them, has been a constant for him over the many years he has spent in Guantánamo. 123 The most important thing in Asadullah's life is his 124 125 daughter, who is now 14 and whom he has not seen since she 126 was a toddler. She hopes to one day be a doctor, and as her 127 father, he supports this wholeheartedly. He was

particularly concerned with recent news concerning attacks
on girls' schools, as he desperately wants his daughter to
learn safely and peacefully. We have worked with Asadullah
and his wife to help support her education and she now has
private tutoring at her home in Kabul, so she can progress
her education until Asadullah returns home. But this is a
slim replacement for what he wants to give his daughter:
the steady support of a parent, helping her with her
homework, and discussing her day over dinner each evening.
Asadullah's intelligence has been on full display since I
first met him some three years ago. During our first
meeting, he presented to me his study of female education
in Afghanistan, a report which emphasized his own
admiration for educators who promote female empowerment
despite pushback from hardline groups. During that same
meeting, I realized just how devoted to his daughter
Asadullah is. Before we spoke about his habeas case, he
told me about his most-recent call with his daughter, where
they spent time going over her homework. I noticed in his
voice that he felt a great deal of pride in knowing that
his daughter came to him for help. Asadullah is university-
educated and is adept with languages, and is able to speak
Pashto, Farsi, Arabic, Urdu, and English. His focus at
university was originally on politics, but he switched to
economics, which reflects his true interests. He is of the
view that his primary duty is to support his family
financially rather than have anything to do with politics,
so he needs to be well-versed in business. He does remain
interests in politics, but almost exclusively in terms of
how he can help bring stability to his country so that his
daughter can enjoy a better life than he has. In
discussing his country, he does not just focus on "peace"

160	as an abstract concept. When we have discussed
161	Afghanistan's future, he has noted the importance of the
162	democratic process as a means of ensuring all Afghans feel
163	that their voices and concerns are heard. He has also
164	emphasized the importance of a modernized and safe
165	infrastructure for Afghanistan. He noted, accurately, that
166	foreign investment will be integral to Afghanistan's future
167	success, and that ensuring tourists, goods, and moneys can
168	be safely transported into and out of the country is a
169	prerequisite for success. This is unsurprising: Asadullah
170	was born into a country devastated by the Soviet invasion,
171	the effects of which are still being felt. His primary
172	focus is on ensuring the Afghanistan he leaves to his
173	daughter will be safe, and prosperous. His daughter,
174	Afghanistan, and our own nation will be better with him
175	free and participating in his own small way in building a
176	better future. This is not an opinion I hold alone. In
177	fact, it is shared by the Government of the Islamic
178	Republic of Afghanistan. This Board is well aware of the
179	support Asadullah has received. I understand that
180	representatives from the Afghan embassy in Washington, DC
181	are present today to view the public portion of this
182	hearing. Further, the government recently took the
183	unprecedented step of filing an amicus curiae brief in
184	Asadullah's habeas proceeding, a copy of which is before
185	the Board. This brief is the equivalent of our own State
186	Department formally requesting the return of an American
187	citizen. As you can imagine, it is not a step lightly
188	taken, and reflects just how seriously our ally wants
189	Asadullah returned. Reading the amicus brief, it is
190	inescapable that the Afghan government knows Asadullah, and
191	has concluded that he is no threat to them or to the United

States. It is also clear that the Afghan Government
engaged in lengthy negotiations with the leadership of HIA,
resulting almost five years ago now in a peace agreement,
an agreement that the Afghan government negotiated with
full agreement from the United States. Thus, many of the
leading members of HIA are now in the government, promoting
peace and opposing extremism. We (his lawyers) have been
to Kabul and have met with the HIA leadership as well as
other members of government, and we have built the lines of
communication that will allow Asadullah to reintegrate
smoothly and safely into society. It should be underlined
that we - along with Asadullah - have agreed to voluntary
security arrangements should the Afghan government deem
them necessary. We do not for a moment think that they are
needed, but it is an indication of Asadullah's good faith
that he is willing to agree to meet any concern that anyone
might have in Afghanistan or anywhere else. In addition to
the support from his government, Asadullah will also enjoy
the support of Reprieve's Life After Guantánamo Project.
This Board has before it a statement from my colleague,
Katherine Taylor, outlining the support Asadullah will
receive upon release. I will not repeat that statement,
except to say that Reprieve will be able to provide
Asadullah with ready access to service providers to ensure
his transition back to Afghanistan is as easy and seamless
as possible. Asadullah will also have the support of a
loving family who is ready to ready to welcome him home
immediately. When he is released, he will live with his
wife, daughter, and brother-in-law in a home they are
currently renting in Kabul. After he has some time to get
back on his feet, they plan on moving to a larger house
that they will be able to live in collectively. I have

224		spoken at length with Asadullah and his brother and plans
225		are already in motion for Asadullah to work as a honey bee
226		keeper. You will have seen in Asadullah's public file his
227		plan for a honey farm. His family has worked to make this
228		goal a reality. I should note that this is a very
229		lucrative and growing industry in Afghanistan. I was not
230		aware of this before meeting Asadullah, but in my research
231		I have found countless articles discussing the growth of
232		the honey bee industry in Afghanistan, and what a boon it
233		has been to entrepreneurs in recent years. I am also told
234		that there is a specific street in Kabul where honey
235		vendors sell their wares and provide tastings. I hope that
236		when I visit him, Asadullahwill give me a discount. I will
237		close by again stating that it truly is an honor to be
238		before this Board with Asadullah. I along with everyone at
239		Reprieve look forward to continuing to support him and his
240		family in the years to come. Thank you for your time, and
241		consideration, and for expediting this hearing. I
242		respectfully submit that Asadullah should be approved for
243		transfer from Guantánamo. I am happy to answer any
244		questions this Board may have.
