- 1 CA: This Periodic Review Board is now reconvened at 0928 hours
- 2 29 June 2021, with regard to the following detainee: Haroon
- 3 al-Afghani ISN 3148.
- 4 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 5 CA: Please keep in mind that this session is in the Secret and
- 6 below level.
- 7 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 8 PM: Board Members remember that when the detainee makes any
- 9 statements those states are presumed to be classified level.
- 10 All discussions or questions need to remain at the
- 11 unclassified level.
- 12 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 13 PM: Asad during this hearing you have the opportunity to make a
- 14 personal statement or answer questions. It is your choice
- whether to make a statement or to answer questions during
- 16 this session. Do you understand my explanation?
- 17 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 18 Detainee: Speaks
- 19 GTMO Translator: Sir.
- 20 PM: Asad do you plan on reading an opening statement this
- 21 morning?
- 22 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 23 Detainee: Speaks.
- 24 GTMO Translator: It would be, I prefer to have my lawyer to
- 25 read it.

26	PM: Ok. You may proceed.
27	PC: Honorable Board members, my name is Asad Haroon a citizen of
28	Afghanistan. I was happily married and blessed with a baby
29	girl just before I was captured in January 2007. I will be
30	providing a written statement to the board for the upcoming
31	hearing as an Afghan that was captured as a prisoner of war.
32	The results of my previous hearings were disappointing. What
33	is even more surprising is that after each hearing I was told
34	that it went very well. But still results of all the
35	hearings were negative. In 2006, there was an agreement
36	between the U.S. and the Afghan government in which any
37	Afghan prisoners would not be transfered to Guantanamo and
38	yet I was sent here in 2007. For about ten years, I was not
39	provided a lawyer, even though I tried my hardest. I was
40	told that a layer would be provided to me but it never
41	happened. This issue lasted till the middle of 2016. All
42	that time I was prevented from accessing any legal
43	representation. For than two hundred Afghans were released
44	from Guantanamo, but I am still kept here. I am a citizen of
45	a country that has been burning in flames for the past four
46	decades. During all these years and even now Afghans are
47	being sacrificed. This tragedy started with the communist
48	ideology. And it continued with the invasion of the Soviet
40	Union The red army enter Afghanistan and destroyed

50	everything. The brutality of the Russians was no less than
51	brutality of Hitler. Millions of Afghans were forced to
52	leave their homes. Hundreds of thousand became disabled more
53	than a million, more than million wives became widows. One
54	point five millions were lost and with the sacrifices with
55	the Afghans people the Russians were defeated. The Soviet
56	Union was dismembered and no one ever scream their chant of
57	hoo-ray again. This chant was thrown in the garbage can of
58	history forever. The world was able to breathe a sigh of
59	relief as the world no longer had a fear the sound of mic
60	twenty-ones or of the Russian tanks. Then the entire world
61	turned their back on Afghanistan. A government that was
62	accepted by all people was not formed until 1.5 million
63	family members where sacrificed. Even though the Russian
64	left Afghanistan and the communist government was removed the
65	fighting did not end in Afghanistan. The Afghan people had
66	hoped for a peacefully life the fighting continued. The
67	fighting took another shape, but nothing really changed.
68	Because the Afghan people continued to sacrifice and suffer;
69	even now. All of the fighting was brought to our door step.
70	We never wished for any of it. My family also had to migrate
71	to Pakistan because of all the fighting. I grew up in an
72	environment of immigrant refugees. In that environment of
73	immigrants I worked on my studies. A scholar from Hesibaya

74	Islam facilitated education and studying and through this we
75	began our lives in the political arm Hesibaya Islam
76	Afghanistan. After I completed my secondary education I
77	attended college. I studied political science at first but
78	then I moved on to major in economics. In 2014, President
79	Obama announced the end of combat operations in Afghanistan
30	and many Afghans were released because of it. In 2016,
31	Hesibaya Islam Afghanistan and the Afghan government signed a
32	peace agreement. The purpose of this agreement was so that
33	there would be a clear path inter Afghan talk to achieve
84	permanent peace. According to the agreement prisoners were
85	to be released within two months. In addition to the U.S.
86	this agreement was recognized by all powerful countries in
87	Europe, the Russians and the United Nations. I was a member
88	of Hesibaya Islam n and I should have been released a few
89	years ago. I am not a member of Al-Qaida nor was I ever a
90	member of Al-Qaida and yet I am left here in Guantanamo.
91	Last year the U.S. and the Taliban entered into a peace
92	agreement. This agreement covered things on both sides the
93	previous U.S. President, President Trump and the current U.S.
94	President, President Biden had both agreed to stop fighting
95	and pull out the remaining foreign troops. The peace talks
96	between the Afghan government and the Taliban have begun.
97	The afghan people are restlessly waiting for a permanent and

98	every lasting peace. Also, I would like the board to know
99	that H.I.A and the Afghan government have signed a peace
100	agreement. Some H.I.A members have join the Afghan
101	government and are serving their country. Due to this peace
102	agreement with H.I.A and the current state of other peace
103	agreements the Afghan government has released thousands of
104	prisoners. When the last Russian General was leaving
105	Afghanistan through Hayritan, the border region between
106	Afghanistan and Usbeckistan and he fried a few rounds towards
107	Afghanistan. His message was we have left but the fighting
108	will live on. Hopefully the fear of fighting goes away when
109	the foreign forces leave Afghanistan. Our national and
110	religious values must be taken into consideration. The
111	independence of Afghanistan must be respected. There can be
112	ever lasting peace with a strong Afghanistan. Afghanistan
113	needs to be left to thrive without the interference of
114	government bureaucracy. Afghanistan has an abundance of
115	natural resources. In a supporting powerful nation can help
116	Afghanistan become self-sufficient with a strong economy.
117	Once Afghanistan is self-sufficient it will no longer be a
118	danger to anyone. The changing shape of fighting is a
119	challenge, but the biggest challenge is focusing attention on
120	peace. The cooperation and respect for Afghans is an
121	important factor in achieving peace. I will evaluate all the

efforts that could be made to achieve peace. It is the
responsibilities of all Afghans and the rest of the world to
help in achieving peace. The prisoners must be released. I
will say this once again with convection that I do not have
any connection to Al-Qaida. I am not a member. I was never
a member of Al-Qaida the national and religious values of my
country are what matter to me. I am an Afghan and I should
not be affiliated with Al-Qaida. I am not a danger to
anyone. I have stated in all the previous hearings that I am
not am member of Al-Qaida and I have always been honest with
this board. I am unsure what additional information I can
provide that will change the board's conclusion. Also, I
want the board to know that my case is different compared to
foreigners in Afghanistan. I am Afghan and I was in my own
country with my own people. If I did anything wrong the
Afghan government should have detained and investigated me.
Looking at the current situation in Afghanistan, including
the changes related to the peace talk and the withdraw of
foreign troops I want to convey to the board members that
there is no need and there has never, and, there, there never
has been a need to keep me here in Guantanamo because I am
not a danger to anyone. My family and I are being punished
while I am being kept here. I want to reunite with my family
again. I want to begin a normal life. I believe, that my,

146	release will contribute to the peace process. Afghanistan is
147	my country. All Afghans share the same sorrow because we
148	Afghans are the ones that are sacrificed in the wars. I hope
149	that President Biden makes the decision to close Guantanamo.
150	Many senators have brought forth many letters and reports to
151	the Biden administration that explain the situation in
152	detail. I am hoping that the board will take into account
153	all the information provided. I am hoping for sympathetic
154	consideration and a positive decision from the board that
155	will bring happiness to myself, my family, and my tribe. I
156	would like to go back to my country. To care for my wife, my
157	fourteen year old daughter and my allying parents. Hopefully
158	peace will prevail in Afghanistan. Respectfully, ISN 3148.
159	PM: Thank you. Asad, you are not obligated to answer any
160	questions posed by the board members. Do you want to answer
161	our questions?
162	DC Translator: Translates above.
163	Detainee: Speaks.
164	PM: Board Members please be mindful of the length of your
165	questions, for the translations and break them into segments
166	as necessary. Okay, anybody want to start real quick. Okay
167	I will take the lead then. Haroon or Asad, I to start by
168	thanking you for attending todays ah, hearing.
169	DC Translator: Translates above.

- 170 Detainee: Speaks.
- 171 GTMO Translator: Thank you Sir.
- 172 PM: I want you to relax huh and ah, just answer the questions to
- 173 the best of your knowledge.
- 174 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 175 Detainee: Speaks.
- 176 GTMO Translator: okay sir.
- 177 PM: So my first question is, is Haroon a common name used for
- 178 males within Afghanistan?
- 179 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 180 Detainee: Speaks.
- 181 GTMO Translator: Yes it's a common name in Afghanistan.
- 182 PM: Thank you. I don't think that there is any dis pute that ah,
- 183 you were a member of H.I.A. hum.
- 184 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 185 PM: And you were a member from a very young age. As you were a
- 186 refuge in Pakistan.
- 187 DC Translator: Translates above.
- 188 Detainee: Speaks
- 189 PM: But my question is, where you involved in any fighting from
- 190 2001 until you were arrested 2007 on behalf of H.I.A.?
- 191 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 192 Detainee: Speaks

193 GTMO Translator: In H.I.A it was different activity. I was attending different activity, ah in H.I.A. group but that's 194 195 not in the fighting. 196 Detainee: I didn't join ah, H.I.A with different activities. As 197 I say in the previous boards, in the past I did enjoy in few 198 local fighting with each other. It was between Afghan and 199 Afghan. There was nothing to, against American. 200 PM: Or against any other coalition partner? 201 Detainee: No. 202 GTMO Translator: Translates above. Detainee: I would like to see this 2016. That I did see that 203 204 (inaudible) that I did not agree with the identity, what's 205 going on in Afghanistan now. I am not member of Taliban. Ah, 206 I disagree with a lot of thing they are doing. And a member if H.I.A. ah, but I protect the recent peace process in 207 Afghanistan because it will bring ah rest for all Afghans and 208 one other points we do not agree with a lot of people in 209 210 Afghanistan but I am not member of Taliban and I was not member of Taliban. But as Afghan and also the Taliban is 211 Afghan but I support the peace process and what's going on 212 right now. 213 PM: Okay, in in recent months the ah Taliban is taking, is 214 taking more control over more areas within Afghanistan. 215

216	do you, do I'm sorry. Do you feel there will become a time
217	when the Taliban will take over the Afghan government?
218	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
219	Detainee: Speaks.
220	GTMO Translator: Time has changed, time has changed.
221	Detainee: And Afghanistan is a country for all Afghans and to
222	do not believe it help if one organization will be powerful
223	to control the whole country. I don't think it was in the
224	past, I don't think it's going to happen again.
225	PM: Where you ever a courier for Hadi al Iraqui?
226	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
227	Detainee: Speaks.
228	GTMO Translator: I don't want to think about my previous life
229	but as I said to the court before I was not (inaudible).
230	PC: Respectfully board member if I could not also ah that that
231	answer in particular is at the vice of his counsel. We
232	currently all though the trial is completed we have an active
233	Habeas case going on where some of the specifics about his
234	past are highly relevant to that and I don't want him to
235	prejudice himself during this hearing and any opportunity
236	after this to discuss any classified information I am
237	happy to explain anything about the past for further hum but
238	I do know that hum that Asad would like to focus on his
239	future at this board.

240	PM: I understand that counselor but what we are trying to do
241	here is, is trying to if I may I would say that his
242	opportunity for being transferred from GTMO stands a better
243	chance through this process than it does through Habeas and
244	what I'm trying to do is I'm trying to establish his
245	connection to either to the Taliban, Al-Qaida and refute
246	those claims so that we can make an actuate decision. So
247	there may be some questions that, that hum, you know I can
248	pretty much say that any answers to the questions come
249	through this particular hearing hum have not been used in the
250	past and I think that pretty consistent. But I would really
251	would like to get you know, sound answers to some of these
252	questions so that we can put an end to some of these
253	allegations that have been against Asad.
254	PC: Can I just have a moment to hum counsel with my client?
255	PM: Yes.
256	Detainee: Speaks.
257	GTMO Translator: Probably seen some people and their fake name.
258	Everyone was wearing the same kind of clothes, Afghans
259	clothes. Ah, I've never been told by nobody that I am Al-
260	Qaida members. I was living in (inaudible) camps and there
261	was a lot of people living there. Those that came to fight
262	against the Russia was living in the refugee camps. I never

seen an indication that there was going to be a trust between 263 264 Afghans and Iraq. 265 Detainee: I am living right now in Camp For five, last 266 five years. A lot of the brothers I do not know their names. We living in Peshawu maybe there was a mistake happen. Those 267 people were back by international Unit Nation and they never 268 trust the Afghan people. I was member of H.I.A.. I was with 269 H.I.A. There's no doubt about that because all of my 270 leadership calling that he is member of H.I.A. So were we 271 coming to the Arab people none of them told me that he was 272 member of Al-Qaida or I am Al-Qaida. This is the truthness. 273 Maybe it is hard to have prove that because I think people 274 have a right to not believe me but I will do my best to ah 275 prevail that I am honest with this one. I spend last fifteen 276 years here. Ah I become close to one result that there is no 277 needs ah, for fighting in Afghanistan. And those foreign 278 people they are fighting and they have their own ambitious 279 (inaudible) which is not, without (inaudible) with our ah 280 281 people. PM: Hum, there is hum, information that you may have lead an 282 anti-coalition militia in an Al-Quida cell in Ungahar in 283 284 Afghanistan. GTMO Translator: Translates above. 285 Detainee: Speaks. 286

287	GTMO Translator: I never fight against the coalition force.
288	Detainee: Speaks.
289	GTMO Translator: I was going to Ungarhar because I was ah doing
290	activities for H.I.A. that doesn't mean that if I go to
291	Ungarhar I was involved in any fighting.
292	Detainee: We have a lot of different activities in Ungarhar.
293	We are working in schools and newer cities. We were working
294	with the tribe leaders. We are working with our own people.
295	And I was active with H.I.A. I did not deny that I was not
296	with H.I.A. but so far things come into I di (inaudible)
297	coalition forces there is no proof for that and I never done
298	that.
299	PM: thank you hum. I understand that, is your wife and your
300	brother now living in Kabul? Or are they still in the
301	refugee camp in Pakistan?
302	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
303	Detainee: My actual family is living in Pakistan in the refugee
304	camps. Since I born and they still I've the same refugee
305	camp there is no change in our lives in any way. But my wife
306	and my daughter since last year they are in Kabul and they
307	are facing some problem with the visa to back to Pakistan
308	because my daughter start school in Kabul. And for last
309	three years she lost, this year she decided stay in Kabul to
310	get her school in Kabul till we ah get that opportunity and

311 she will go back to Pakistan. And we will be new in Kabul 312 together if I transfer from here. 313 PM: Great. Now I've ah, looked extensively at your plan for 314 post GTMO employment. Basically your honey farm and your desire to augment that through a bakery. 315 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 316 Detainee: After the firs board I had been ah. 317 PM: So is that still your desire if you were to be transferred 318 from GTMO? 319 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 320 Detainee: after the second board the firs board I had been told 321 that I do not have any plan for my future. While I was 322 studying a lot here under the consequences we have here. But 323 I decided to study all that information about honey bee farms 324 and the ah bakeries (inaudible) my daughters and I very 325 desired to if I go back of course I will start from very 326 small things I cannot make it in just one day two. And ah I 327 put all that in my report in hope that I reach my goal, my 328 point. 329 PM: What does your daughter ant to do once she graduates from 330 college? 331 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 332 Detainee: Speaks. 333

GTMO Translator: She desire to be a doctor.

335	PM: Outstanding. Okay, anybody else?
336	BM: Yes Asad if peace breaks down from whatever reason the
337	taluiab breaks that agreement. What wuol dhappen to your and
338	your family in Afgahstan?
339	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
340	Detainee: firs we wishing lot and we hope that the peace
341	process take the bliss because I think it's all Afghan tired
342	from this war and everyone is (inaudible) very wishing to
343	have a peace and ah I don't think the peace process will be
344	broke down. Because this is the wish of the people. But we
345	still living in refugee camps and I hope that the peace take
346	place to we come back to our country to start our new life in
347	the all (inaudible to help the peace process. I think this
348	is the wish of the Afghan people. And I think this time the
349	peace process is very serious. I hope this happen.
350	BM: if you did return to Afghanistan, what would that mean for
351	you, your family and your tribe as a former Guantanamo Bay
352	detainee?
353	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
354	Detainee: Speaks. Can you please explain that question a little
355	bit? Can you repeat please?
356	BM: Absolutely. As a former detainee at Guantanamo Bay many
357	people will know this. What will that mean for you, for your
358	family and for your tribe; where you will live?

359	Detainee: I would like to see what I learn here in Guantanamo
360	Bay. And I cannot change the past. But what I learn here
361	and what learn my family, and I thinks, it will help the
362	people, and help us, that's no one will go back to any
363	negative activities. And ah, we will try to help all the
364	positive process in Afghanistan, the peace the order and law,
365	and the security. And this is one thing, the other thing is
366	it will mean to my family that I am reunited with my family
367	to focus on my own family issues, especially in my daughters
368	educations, and other children's or kids we have in our
369	family. And this the best things what I believe no one will
370	be successful in his life. I need and we need in our family
371	to build and rebuild our family again so far we have happy
372	life. This why I name it the honey bee farms on my
373	daughter's name because for last fourteen years, I did not
374	done for her anything, without my lawyers support and they
375	really supporting her about her educations and I hope
376	(inaudible) honey bee farms will be also just for her to stay
377	on her own feet and to be becoming as a successful women in
378	Afghanistan.
379	BM: Thank you do you feel that, oh please.
380	Detainee: No I'm sorry for my broken English.
381	BM: Much better than my Afghan so do no apologize. So I

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appreciate your ah, desire to help your daughter grow. That

202	in
383	is very respectfully as a father. Do you feel you are
384	responsible for her growing up without you right now? Or
385	from your previous actions?
386	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
387	Detainee: I will take all the responsibility with full
388	(inaudible) while I'm not with her and she grow up without
389	me. Especially my wife have a lot of patience. I discussing
390	her with a lot of guards; I have a divorce after six months
391	because I was not in my family. But my wife is a staying by
392	me for almost fifteen years and I thinks I have the biggest;
393	I blame myself and I very responsible for that; to my family,
394	to my wife and to my daughter.
395	BM: Thank you.
396	BM: Thank you for participating in today hearing. Hum, I want
397	to talk a little bit about hum you know where your thinking
398	is now as you reflect back hum to your earlier years in your
399	life. From your statements its sounds like a lot of things
400	happened in your life in Afghanistan that were beyond your
401	control like the invasion by the Soviet Forces that hum, that
402	led to a lot of hum, what was happening in Afghanistan.
403	PR: Give us a second to break for translation.
404	GTMO Translator: Can you repeat the first part.
405	BM: Absolutely, so I want to focus in on what your thinking is
406	today.

- 407 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 408 BM: But in doing that, I want you to think about your past
- 409 activities.
- 410 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 411 BM: And I know that there was a lot of things that happened in
- 412 Afghanistan that were not in your control.
- 413 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 414 BM: But I want you to think about the things that were in your
- 415 control and the things that you did.
- 416 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 417 BM: At some point you made the decision to leave your family.
- 418 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 419 BM: And some actions you are based on your counsel's advice not
- 420 willing to fully discuss with the board and I fully
- 421 understand that.
- 422 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 423 BM: What I want to know is, do you think you did any actions
- 424 that harmed your family and others?
- 425 GTMO Translator: Translates above.
- 426 PR: Can you just give us a quick. Counsel wants to have a
- 427 discussion on this.
- 428 PM: Sure go ahead.
- 429 PR: Okay thank you.

430	Detainee: I would like to come in the point I think you say
431	four or five points hum I cannot change the past. This is
432	one thing and I do not have control of that now. Hum, past
433	is over but of course my family suffering, they suffering
434	while I was here in Guantanamo Bay. But if I go back to
435	Afghanistan about my future I learn a lot here and I don't
436	think I will go to the past again. If something was wrong.
437	My only focus is on the future. My only focus is what I
438	learned from my past. And I don't know I hear anyone
439	directly. I did not realize that, as far as I know. But one
440	thing I am for sure that my family been harm because of me.
441	I was here for fourteen years and fifteen years. And I thin
442	all the Afghan is sharing the same experience.
443	BM: So let me asked you a direct question.
444	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
445	BM: Do you take any responsibility for the actions that led you
446	to being arrested a captured?
447	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
448	Detainee: Speaks.
449	GTMO Translator: I will take responsibility that I have been
450	captured.
451	Detainee: And I would like to say that I am responsible for
452	that.
453	BM: How about for the actions that led to your capture?

454 GTMO Translator: Translates above. Detainee: I told in my old hearing boards in the past that I 455 456 did not capture in the war. And there's no proof that I did 457 kill anyone. And there's no proof I did fight against coalition force. But I will take the responsibility for I 458 459 being capture. I think it was wrong times, it was wrong place. 460 461 BM: Is there anything else that you would have changed about your life prior to your capture? 462 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 463 Detainee: Can you please explain this one a little bit more 464 465 please so I can understand. BM: yeah, so it sounds like you're thinking that you really did 466 467 ah, knowingly hurt anybody etcetera. GTMO Translator: Translates above. 468 BM: What I'm interested in, looking back, looking back at your 469 younger years before you arrived at Guantanamo, would you 470 have lived your life any differently? 471 472 GTMO Translator: Translates above. Detainee: If I could return my life, maybe I was not here now. 473 Maybe I was in different place or in better situations. 474 BM: So is there anything you wish you would have done 475

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differently?

GTMO Translator: Translates above.

476

478	Detainee: If I think of, if I got to the past, if I think I am
479	fourteen years old and I have this mentality; if I have te
480	mentality I have it now of course maybe it was more better
481	like completely better. Maybe I wasn't in good place in good
482	situations; what I believe now.
483	PR: Can we take a minute, I think there's a point he's trying to
484	make that the counsel and I have discussed in the place that
485	I don't think is coming across very well. Just give us one
486	second sir.
487	Detainee: Speaks.
488	GTMO Translator: Speaks. I am going to explain to you very
489	shortly. If I am living in the present life, I was going to
490	done stuff differently. Wisely with my understating.
491	BM: Can you give me examples of what you would do differently?
492	Detainee: Maybe I was trying to go to America Europe to have a
493	modern life. To be able to involve in many things. Even
494	with H.I.A. But the refugee camps situation did not allows
495	us to have that opportunity. I went to the school into the
496	college in very tough situations. We ever just surviving and
497	learning somethings based on the refugee camps status. Very
498	basic life materials. The mentality there was the refugee
499	camp were completely difference this was time of war, and we
500	were living with the people, like as you see me here now.
501	PM: Anybody else?

- BM: Asad thank you for talking with us today. Where did you 502 503 learn English? 504 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 505 Detainee: Speaks. GTMO Translator: Broken English I learned in Guantanamo Bay. 506 BM: It's probably a little better than broken. But however did 507 508 you learn English? 509 GTMO Translator: Translates above. 510 Detainee: To be honest I watched some movies and talk with the guards and the people and the guards, read the small books 511 512 and I attend the school, the class here for like seven years. 513 And right now speaking with my lawyers, we do not have that 514 much problems. When I was watching the movie, I was stopping 515 the lanes to learn the English. To listening the speak how they talking and writing. And attending the class also. 516 Myself educations is biggest factor to learn English. 517 518 Thank you, did you take any other courses at Guantanamo? GTMO Translator: Translates above. 519 Detainee: ah yes, the Art, ah computer and some general 520 521 education nutrition. Yes, all those class I. BM: You, I think you hum, studied at university for about two 522 years? Do you have any jobs after that or while you were 523
- 525 GTMO Translator: Translates above.

studying?

526	Detainee: (inaudible) for Four years since my desire was to go
527	to political science but ah because of some things, I decided
528	to go to economic departments for four years. But
529	unfortunately after I graduate from university this was the
530	civilian war times and Taliban take over in Afghanistan.
531	It's hard to find a job in Peshawar or Kabul. It was not

533	they say (inaudible) also. Peace on the seasons.
534	BM: Thank you. Does your bother Roman live, if I have the
535	pronunciation right does he live Pakistan?
536	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
537	Detainee: My parents and my brother we lining together in
538	refugee camps. Yes he is living right now with my parents in
539	the refugee which belongs to H.I.A. but only my daughter and
540	my wife is right now because of the transfer problems and
541	they stay in Kabul with her mom.
542	BM: Does your brother have a job?
543	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
544	Detainee: Yes my brother, he is a teacher. His wife, is also
545	educate she ah translating some books for some schools and
546	make some money. And ah, he has six children's. All them
547	educate like high system schools. Four of them speaking
548	English, very better than my English. And my brother has a
549	center teaching in the school

BM: Okay thank you. I don't have any other questions right 550 551 now. 552 PM: That concludes questions for you from the Board Members. 553 Asad, a transcript of today's hearing may be posted to the 554 Periodic Review Secretariat's website. Do you wish to have the transcript posted? If yes, 555 PR: Yeah, on page sixteen. 556 Detainee: Yes I understand. I do not have any problem, if you 557 558 want to publish it. 559 PM: Personal Representative and Private Counsel, do you have any 560 final questions for Asad? 561 PR: Because you missed it. That's you again, middle of page 562 sixteen. GTMO Translator: Translates above. 563 564 PR/PC: Yes, Sir. Just a couple. PM: Personal Representative and Private Counsel, you may proceed 565 566 with your questions for the detainee. GTMO Translator: Translates above. 567 PR: Asad you and I have spoken in the past about why as a 568 569 female you think it's important for your daughter, why it's significant for your daughter to become a doctor. Can you 570 571 just give a little bit more information why especially as a

female that that's important in Afghanistan? You can say in

574	Detainee: My daughter first like to become a doctor. This the
575	one things. And she can help our own people especially the
576	females back in Afghanistan the education is very low.
577	Especially female educations. Also this is financial help
578	for her and her future and I do not want to, if she desire t
579	go to medical then I will support her because that's desire
580	and I should respect that.
581	PR: Thank you, and just one more. Do you think if you were to
582	return to Afghanistan that because you were detained in
583	Guantanamo that will put you at any sort of disadvantage in
584	Afghanistan.
585	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
586	Detainee: I think it will not have any negative effect on me.
587	And also its about me how I will run my life and to, I think
588	sir, that it will ah, more helpful than what I try to do the
589	positive things and people will and hope that they will take
590	some benefit from that. Not negative.
591	PC: I just have one question. Asad you spoken a little bit
592	about it before about how much you hope that the peace will
593	hold in Afghanistan and your desire for that. But we had
594	spoken a little bit more why you think Afghan won't accept
595	the Taliban taking over. I was hoping you can say a little
596	bit more about that.
597	Detainee: Speaks.

598	GTMO Translator: It's not an organization they can implement by
599	force
600	GTMO Translator: Translates above. Everybody should be treated
601	equally.
602	Detainee: Speaks.
603	GTMO Translator: Translates above. I think women's are the most
604	victim people in Afghanistan.
605	Detainee: I hope that the Afghan government is taking this very
606	serious. That the Afghan female is ah, victim more than
607	anyone else. The Afghan female needs educations, the Afghan
608	female needs support, ah the afghan female need to be treat
609	as a man back in Afghanistan, because I don't want to happen
610	any negatives things to my daughter, to my sisters and ah if
611	any organizations if try again to control all Afghans base on
612	their own mentality (inaudible). It will be not acceptable
613	and none of the Afghan will accept that. Right now the
614	Afghans understand that after four decade war and there are
615	suffering from that things and everyone, everyone understand
616	that without all Afghan together there will be no peace in
617	Afghanistan. No one should be ignoring. We need to rebuild
618	our country, to make our people safe, and happy and everyone
619	has chance to educate, education and to support their,
620	financial support their own efforts.

621	PM: Do members of the Board have any additional questions in
622	light of the Personal Representative's and/or Private
623	Counsel's questions?
624	GTMO Translator: Translates above.
625	PM: Asad, do you have anything further you wish to say to the
626	board.
627	Detainee: ah yes. I would like to say one things. Ah, I still
628	believe that I'm not educate person. I am not want to call
629	myself like I am (inaudible) because is not. It very hard
630	for me to go through process even after all the last four
631	boards but I was very disappointed. For last reasons. While
632	I see thousand people release from Afghanistan and all
633	Afghans be released from here. No one is here speaking my
634	language and unfortunately it's not like this is a complain
635	but I have no access to any of my language or anythings. Ah
636	I would like to say again that I am not (inaudible) to
637	anyone. I cannot change my past. I was member of H.I.A I
638	never attach coalition forces. The condition I was in the
639	past was very difficult and in the future I would try to be
640	reunited with my family. To support and help my family.
641	And to do all my effort to achieve, how to support the peace
642	process back in Afghanistan. I'm not here to say those
643	things because I want to be out from Guantanamo, I don't know
644	what the guard decide for me. You people will decide but

645	only am I suffering ere from this detention, there's thirty-
646	four million Afghan has the same problems. Hopefully we
647	forget the past and start a new future with positive steps
648	and I think I need a chance to prove that out of Guantanamo
649	Bay. People do not believe me here because they maybe
650	thinking I want to go to out from here. Maybe they thinking
651	if I go back, I join back the same militants groups whatever.
652	Maybe they thinking I cannot run my life. Maybe someone
653	offer to me money I go again. But I very confidence and it's
654	my words; if I go back my own desire, my own ambition, my own
655	wish and hope is just to help my family financially and help
656	them and support them in education and help the peace for
657	everyone. Thank you hearing. For the opportunity to give it
658	to me today.
659	PM: Okay, thank you. Haroon al-Afghani (ISN 3148), this
660	concludes your participation in this hearing. The Board will
661	continue in a classified session. You're Personal
662	Representative and Private Counsel will remain and continue
663	to advocate on your behalf.
664	DC Translator: Translates above.
665	PM: The Board will deliberate to determine whether continued law
666	of war detention is warranted. You will be advised of the
667	results.
