DC Translator: [Translates of above] 10 11 CA: The detainee's Personal Representative, Private Counsel, the detainee, and one translator are located at the detention 12 facility, U.S. Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. They are 13 14 attending via video teleconference. The detainee has waived translation of the unclassified summary, Personal 15 16 Representative's statement, and the Private Counsel's statement. Today the detainee intends to read aloud his 17 opening unclassified statement, as well as submit applicable 18 19 witness statements. The Private Counsel and Detainee opening statements have been posted to the Periodic Review 20 21 Secretariat website. Foreign, national and local media, 22 Foreign Government Officials, and Representatives from Non-Governmental Organizations are observing this session. 23 DC Translator: [Translates of above] 24 PM: This Board is convened to determine whether continued law of 25 war detention is warranted for Hani Saleh Rashid Abdullah ISN 26 27 841 to protect against a continuing significant threat to the 28 security of the United States. From here on forward, we will refer to the detainee as Hani. This session of the hearing is 29 unclassified. 30

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PM: Hani, this is your Periodic Review Board to determine
whether continued law of war detention is warranted in your
case. Continued law of war detention will be warranted if it
is necessary to protect against a continuing significant
threat to the national security of the United States. The
focus of this hearing is on the threat you may pose to the
United States and its interests if transferred or released
from U.S. custody. It is not on the lawfulness of your
detention.

PM: The Personal Representative and Private Counsel are your
representatives to assist you during this process. Finally,
the translators ensure that everyone understands your
statements and that you understand what is being said during
the hearing.

PM: Personal Representative and Private Counsel, has the
detainee had an opportunity to review the Unclassified
Summary? We couldn't hear you. Is that an affirmative?
DC Translator: Ok.
PM: Do a sound test we can't hear you. Major
PR: Yes, Sir.
PM: Okay, there we go. Now we can hear you. Thank you.

PM: Okay. I will now read the unclassified summary: Hani Saleh
Rashid Abdullah ISN-841 traveled to fight in Afghanistan in
June 2001, trained at al-Qa'ida's al-Farouq camp, and
admitted to a close association with some of the group's
external operations planners and senior leaders, including
senior al-Qa'ida operative and 9/11 conspirator Walid bin
Attash, better known as Khallad ISN 10014. Hani was one of
the Yemenis arrested during the 11 September 2002 raids in

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64	Karachi, Pakistan, later labeled as the "Karachi Six," based
65	on concerns that they were part of an al-Qa'ida operational
66	cell intended to support a future attack. Based on a review
67	of all available reporting, we judge that this label more
68	accurately reflects the common circumstances of their arrest
69	and that it is more likely that the six Yemenis were elements
70	of a large pool of Yemeni fighters that senior al-Qa'ida
71	planners considered potentially available to support future
72	operations. Hani was probably intended by al-Qa'ida senior
73	leaders to return to Yemen to support eventual attacks in
74	Saudi Arabia, but he may not have been witting of these
75	plans. Does the Personal Representative or Private Counsel
76	wish to make an unclassified Opening Statement at this time?

- PR: Good morning, esteemed Members of the Board, thank you for 98 99 the opportunity to present this statement on behalf of Hani 100 Saleh Rashid Abdullah, ISN 841. The intent of this statement 101 is to address any concerns previously raised by the Periodic Review Board File Review process. I have served as Hani's 102 Personal Representative since May of 2018. He has been an 103 active participant throughout that period and has expressed 104 105 his willingness to answer questions that Board members may 106 pose. His willingness to participate, despite being coaxed not to by disenchanted detainees, shows moral courage. More 107 importantly, he sees the PRB as his best chance for ventral 108 eventual release or transfer. During his detention, Hani has 109 attained an understanding for cultural and religious 110 111 diversity. He also realizes that if there is to be peace, respecting others despite their differences is imperative. 112 Hani has always maintained an upbeat mentality. Throughout 113 114 the course of our meetings, Hani has been very candid regarding his current mindset, and at times displays remorse 115 116 for embarking on the course of action that led to his current predicament. Hani continues to maintain one of the lowest 117 118 Detainee Incident rates since his arrival in 2002. He actively participates in classes and during our meetings, 119 demonstrates retained knowledge of the electrical trade he 120 learned growing up in Yemen. In anticipation of today's 121 122 Board, Hani felt the need to read his prepared statement in 123 addition to its submission for review. As part of his 124 submission, Hani has outlined his intent to establish a complete printing company with inheritance money he received 125 from his father's passing along with help from his family. 126 127 During his most recent File Review, Hani's elder brother

128		wrote a letter to the Board that expounded on his family's
129		willingness to support him in every way. Lastly, despite
130		being detained for 17 years and yearning to be reunited with
131		his family, Hani realizes that the Yemen that he left lies in
132		a state of civil unrest. Therefore, if afforded the ability
133		to be transferred or released, he is to open to other
134		possibilities outside of his homeland. Thank you for your
135		consideration.
136	PM:	Private Counsel, please proceed if you have any opening
137		statement.
138	PC:	I do. Thank you. Good morning. I am Charley Carpenter, an
139		attorney from Missoula Montana, and have been representing
140		Hani Saleh Rashid Abdullah prisoner number 841 since the
141		beginning of 2005. I have spent countless hours with him over
142		that time, and long ago formed the definite view that the
143		national security of the United States does not depend on his
144		continued imprisonment. He is not now, nor, as far as I can
145		tell has ever been, a dangerous ideologue. He has never
146		expressed any inclination towards violence. Nor, even, has he
147		indicated any anger at the United States. Frustration that he
148		is missing his family and his adult life, yes, but not anger.
149		He recognizes that he is here because of some bad decision he
150		made as a young man, decisions he had already come to regret
151		even before his had already come to regret even before his
152		capture and imprisonment. I have reviewed a great deal of the
153		classified material concerning him, and nothing I have seen
154		contradicts my view my impression of Hani. He has tried to
155		comply with the rules of the prison, and also to use his time
156		here to better himself. He is, in my opinion, better prepared
157		for life after Guantanamo than he was when the Board
158		considered his case three years ago. I hope the Board will

159	recommend his transfer out of the prison. Thank you for your
160	consideration.
161	PM: Thank you. Board Members may reserve questions until
162	detainee and witness statements have been presented in their
163	entirety. Does anyone have a question for the detainee at
164	this time?
